A few days ago, I've had the opportunity visit Chhattisgarh and attending Sirpur National Music and Dance Festival was one of the most remarkable experiences. India organizes a number of traditional festivities and fêtes. With these kinds of fêtes, one gets to be up close personal with culture. This festival is a platform for various states of India to showcase dance and music forms pertaining to historical and tourist places to boost their art, culture and tourism. Konark Festival, Khajuraho Festival and Elephanta Festival already have made their mark.

Sirpur National Music and Dance Festival, which was started in the year 2013 in Sir-

IMPACT OF TSP ON LIVELIHOOD OF BENEFECIARIES

National Agricultural Innovation Project entitled "Livelihood and Nutritional Security of Tribal Dominated Areas Through Integrated Farming System and Technology Models"was executed by Directorate of Extension Education, Udaipur with a total outlay of 23.98 crores in the four disadvantaged districts of southern Rajasthan viz., Banswara, Dungarpur, Sirohi and Udaipur by involving 7 Consortia partners with 16344 farm households in 10 clusters comprising 90 villages. Out of the total farm households, 77.2 per cent were Scheduled Tribe, 15.4 per cent OBC, 3.7 per cent Scheduled Caste and 3.6 per cent households were under General category. In



the sub-project entire families in the adopted villages were selected. Thus, there was cent per cent women participation. The main aim of the project was to improve livelihood security of rural people living in the selected villages through technology-led innovations encompassing a wider

process of social and economic change. The major activities involved components of Integrated Farming System and adoption of improved technologies. Market linkages and synergy with ongoing programmes were further strengthened. Major emphasis was given on developing mechanisms for post project sustainability of livelihood of the targeted families.

In the project there were 8 consortium partners. The project was rated as one of the best project among 32 sub- projects sanctioned under Sustainable Rural Livelihood Security. Several Innovations were introduced in this project and Sustainability Fund concept was also introduced in

other World Bank projects. Project covered 16344 farm households in 10 clusters comprising 90 villages. To increase productivity of existing crops in the project area 14303 ha area was brought under hybrids HYV's/hybrids. The productivity of cops increased from 20 to 162 percent over local check. Vegetable cultivation was promoted in an area of 1228.4 ha. Spectacular results were obtained and farmer earned Rs. 25000 to 60000/- from just 0.2 ha land area. Remarkable results are visible from breed improvement work on goats and more than 20000 progenies are visible in the area. Aquaculture activities in Banswara district increased income and employment
