T-24 pass the acclimatization test of forest authorities

Udaipur: Few termed it 'life imprisonment' while some believed it was fair to send T-24, the Man Eater of Ranthambore to



be caged in the Sajjangarh Zoological Park here at Udaipur. Whatever the perception might be, the fact now is 'Ustaad', the nine year old majestic cat from the Ranthambore wilds, has completed the acclimatization process successfully after 90 days of his relocation. Authorities believe the shrew is responding to the taming

process, however, it will take some more time before he is completely ready to be brought for the public display. The tiger was banished from Ranthambore sanctuary for allegedly have killed four people in five years with most recent case of a forest guard whom T-24 attacked on May 8. Foresters had believed that the beast had become very bold and lost shyness of human beings and hence it was dangerous to allow it a free run in the wild. Rahul Bhatnagar, the chief conservator of forest (wild life) said. In the extreme summer days, T-24 spend most of the time at the water hole, growled or roared to see the caretaker coming to monitor him. Gradually notable changes were visible as he conditioned himself to grow calmer. "He has left his wild ways and now plays in the muddy water like a normal beast. He no more growls but continues to rest when the caretaker goes near his enclosure but he slightly lift the tail to show his discomfort at the interference" Bhatnagar added.

Not mere plants, call them Shivendra, Adnan, Chitrangada ...

Udaipur: The Zoology department of the University's Science college here has initiated a customized plantation drive at its campus. Saplings growing here would not merely be a Neem, Ashok, Havan or Guggul tree but have names of the caretaker students who would nourish them during the entire duration of their course. So apart from their biological names. plants here would be known as Adnan, BohraNisa, Shivendra, Chitrangada and so on.... "This is in pursuance to the UGC's recent instructions to all varsities to take up ' One studentone plant' campaign from the new academic session whereby each undergraduate student has to plant a sapling in the campus" informed Dr Arti Prasad, head of the Zoology department. " Had we not thought of the idea of christening, students would have taken plantation as yet another mundane task and not participate whole heartedly but things are different now with the name theme" Dr Prasad said. In a wasteland adjoining the department, two gardens are being developed under the campaign. We have planted saplings of Ashok, Rudhraksh, Neem, Havan, Gaund, Mogra, Hibiscus, Marigold, Juhi, Malti and many more varieties "she said. Some 125 students of the department have already joined who are now responsible for nourishing their babies. When the batch would pass out, the names of the students would be inscribed on a stone to be installed in the garden and next batch would take over the task. "We have planned to take the UGC campaign little ahead by embarking on a Green University mission. In the second stage, tenders would be called for all affiliated colleges and plantation work would be linked with livelihood sources for the down trodden class" said Prof I.V Trivedi, the Vice Chancellor of MLSU.

Students of MG College protested

Udaipur: Students from Meera Girls College on Wednesday staged a protest outside the collector's office to show their discomfort over not getting the subjects of their choice. The girls displayed their anger and handed over a memorandum to the district collector Rohit Gupta demanding him to consider their request and to instruct the college administration to allot the subjects to the girls of their choices. Aruna Khatik, one of the student leaders from Akhil Bhartiya Vidharthi Parishad informed that the problem of getting subject of their choice was majorly faced by the students of first year B.A. They chose the subject according to their preference yet were allotted other subjects by the administration. Besides this, they had also intimated the Principal of the College Prem Oswal about their problems at least 25 days back. Upon meeting the students, Oswal had assured them to change their subjects according to their preferences but nothing was done, Aruna claimed. The situation is such that there are few girls who still want to exchange their opted subjects with other girls. The matter is under consideration and soon a decision in favor of girls will be taken, added Oswal.

Youth commits suicide in Delhi

Udaipur: Frustrated at failed attempts to secure a job he desired and was trained for, a 25-year-old boy from Udaipur committed suicide. Saiyyed Nadeem, son of Saiyyed Kamar Iqbal, a resident of Mukherjee Chowk in Udaipur, was found dead in a hotel room in Paharganj area of New Delhi on Friday. He committed suicide by injecting some poisonous substance, Delhi Police informed his family over the phone. The post-mortem examination was conducted on Saturday after his father and a few relatives flew to Delhi. Nadeem. who hailed from a well-off and educated family, had passed class XII from a leading school in Udaipur. Thereafter, he completed a diploma course in marine engineering from Lonavala. He was the only son and has a sister. His mother is an associate professor of zoology at a government college in Udaipur. Nadeem was under training and had gone to Delhi on August 9. He was awaiting a training placement which had been rescheduled many times.

PM Modi seeks support of Pacific nations for UNSC seat JAIPUR: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Friday sought the support of 14 Pacific island nations for India's permanent membership at the UN Security Council, in return promising help for an inclusive climate treaty to a region threatened with submergence due to global warming.

At the plenary session of the second India-Pacific Island Cooperation meet here, Modi emphasized on the need to reform the UN, born 70 years ago, so that it can keep pace with the "changing world" and sought their support for India's claim on permanent membership at the UN Security Council.

The Prime Minister said India supported the interests of small island nations on capacity building in the outcome document on the post-2015 development agenda called sustainable development goals and for a dedicated seat for them in an expanded and reformed Security Council.

Modi also touched upon the sensitive issue of climate change saying it was an "existential" threat to Pacific islands and millions lives on India's shoreline. "We both seek a concrete and effective outcome on climate change in Paris later this year," Modi said, minutes before leader after leader of the Pacific nations sought New Delhi's help to have an equitable agreement at the global climate meet.

Areport by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) says that most of the islands in Pacific region will submerge if the present rate of carbon emissions continue, which could lead to an increase in surface temperature by four degree Celsuis by the turn of the century.

BJP-Independent candidates wipe out Congress in Udaipur Udaipur: Proving all the fears Previous boards, however,

and speculations wrong, the BJP managed to retain its hold in two of the three Nagar Palikas in Udaipur while independent candidates under the flagship of Janta Sena, a 2year-old party formed by BJP rebel and independent legislator Randhir Singh Bhinder, made a remarkable debut by winning 17 of the 20 seats of the Bhinder municipal body.

BJP won the Fatehnagar and Salumber Nagar Palikas with a clean majority, however, it failed to gain a single seat in Bhinder. Celebrations broke out at the party offices in both the places as the results came one by one of the BJP candidates defeating their opponents in various wards. At Fatehnagar of the 20 seats, BJP won 14 while congress was limited to 5 seats while at Salumber BJP won on 15, congress 4 and an independent candidate of the 20 seats here.

saffron party managed to fight the adversities specially after the number of controversies that had recently hit the party bigwigs. Celebrations marked the district BJP office at Patel Circle with the final announcement of results.

Party workers cheered slogans, distributed sweets and set off fireworks to express their delight on the consecutive victories after General, State and Municipal Corporation elections. While at Bhinder, celebrations was the order of day at legislator Randhir Singh's home where supports and winning candidates gathered in large number to rejoice their victory.

"We were sure to win 13-14 seats but had not expected this much. We are grateful to the public who voted out the major parties and laid their trust on independent candidates" Randhir Singh said.

BJP has lost the moral right to govern, says Pilot

Jaipur: BJP has lost the moral right to govern in Raiasthan after the vote of noconfidence against it in the civic polls, Congress state president Sachin Pilot said on Thursday.

"I am satisfied with the results of the poll. Congress workers were up against all odds put up by the BJP government which misused administration to all extent. People rejected BJP's claim of target 120 despite the party having government at Center and state...," Pilot told the media at the Pradesh Congress Committee office

Of the total of 3.351 wards in 129 civic bodies, Congress and others won 1,908 wards while BJP wrested the remaining 1,443. The civic bodies had gone to polls on August 17.

The BJP leaders claim the vote is for the development and faith in the chief minister but the reality check is that twothird of the votes went against the party, Pilot said. "How can BJP consider it as its victory? They have won the municipal corporation (Ajmer) but at municipal council, it is Congress. Even the vote difference has come down to 1% which was 26% in the Lok Sabha polls."

"People have replied to Raje who is surrounded with controversies as she lost ground in her own area

Jhalawar Patan. Anta and Baran. She even lost in her home district. Dholpur. Congress has proved that people are looking at us with hope," he added. Jhalawar is chief minister Vasundhara Raje's constituency while her son Dushyant Singh is MP from Jhalawar-Baran. "Now that the Raiasthan CM has lost in Jhalawar-Dholpur, what does BJP has to say over the allegations of black money and corruption? BJP has lost moral right of governance. We were tired of listening of corruption...but interestingly the first corruption case involved the name of Lalit Modi," Pilot said.

PM Modi and BJP president

Amit Shah should take notice of the fact that Raje lost in her turf, the Congress state chief said. "BJP needs to brainstorm why their vote share is declining.... People have shown them the mirror, "Speaking of his parliamentary constituency Aimer where B.IP received the mandate, he said of 60 wards, BJP won on 31 and Congress on 22. This despite, he said, the campaign done by three ministers along with their MLAs, MP and others. "Our vote bank has increased in comparison to the previous polls, BJP can play with figures to prove their point but the poll result is a no-confidence vote against them.
