



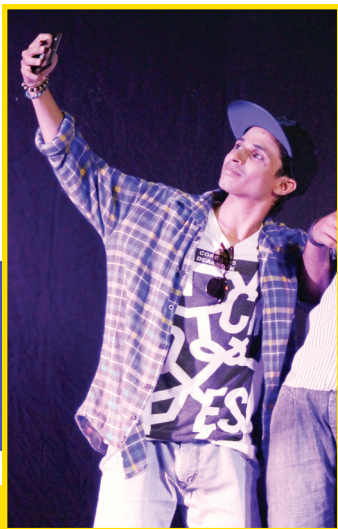

will take over as President – Global Zinc Business. This decision was taken in Hindustan Zinc's Board of Directors meeting held today. Duggal, an Alumni of IMD, Lausanne, Switzerland and IIM, Kolkata brings with him 32 years of rich manufacturing industry experience in project management, operations, HR and Supply chain. He has played a significant role towards sustainability & safety awareness, built best-in-class mining and smelting techniques, mechanization & automation of operational activities, successful commissioning and ramp up of mining, smelting & refinery units at Hindustan Zinc. Three families who were found begging at the bus stand were asked of their whereabouts and sent back to their home towns. Singh Sansthan led the counseling part while teams from Bhupalpura and Surajpol police stations and traffic personnel assisted in the identification task during Samvedana Operation.

New Delhi : NASSCOM to organize the Start-Up Konnect 2015 in partnership with TIE Silicon Valley and IIM Ahmedabad's business incubator CII

Entrepreneurs, founders of social impact startups, technology leaders to join the gathering. Following the Prime Minister's clarion call of 'Start-Up India, Stand Up India' from the ramparts of the Red Fort, NASSCOM, TIE Silicon Valley, and IIM Ahmedabad's CII India are hosting the first India-U.S. Startup Konnect in the Silicon Valley on 27th September, to showcase the strengths of India's startup ecosystem. This day-long event, on the side of the prime minister's visit to the Silicon Valley, will highlight the multiple dimensions of Indian innovation capabilities, represented by more than 30 startups across a variety of sectors such as agriculture, healthcare, energy, financial inclusion and biotechnology, as well as leading technology business incubators in the country. These startups will also exhibit



their products, prototypes, and achievements to investors and other potential Valley partners. The Prime Minister will visit the exhibition to encourage the Indian startups exhibiting their products there.

The Commercialization of Education in India

It means that "A mother and father who do not encourage their child's education are his enemies indeed, an illiterate among educated one is the same as, in a group of swans the crow is neither wanted nor admired. Education has always been and continues to be one of the most important needs of mankind.

I remembered, during early 90's if someone passed 12th exam with First Class (more than 60% marks) then parents used to distribute sweets in whole society but it is disheartening to see that recently, one of my friend's daughter passed CBSE 12th class exams with 90% & parents were looking so sad that as if she has failed... Reason is very simple, during 90's I think there were only handful students who scored more than 90% but today I think situation has reversed i.e. there are only handful students who scored less than 90%.

Meaning

According to the dictionary the word 'commercializes' means: To render commercial, make a matter of trade or the subject to commercialism. Thus, it means to apply commercial or business method, to make use of, or exploit mainly for profit, especially at the expense of quality, or to imbue with commercialism. Thus the word commercialization shows the profit as the main motive behind any activity. The term education has been defined as the process of developing and training the powers and capabilities of human beings. Thus if there is sale of services or profit motive behind imparting of education or funds come mainly from the receivers of education, we can easily say that there is commercialization of education.

Over a period of time, Education has become a commodity in India especially in terms of Higher Education. All the genres of society are so overly obsessed with education that it has devalued the real essence of education.

Since privatization has embedded its root in almost all the sectors of India, it is obvious that education sector will also be penetrated by it. Facing difficulty in meeting the expectation of the people with the lack of resources and



funds with the government, the private sector has established its base in the Indian education system. But unfortunately, their motive of entering the education system is not that of providing quality education but of making money and viewing it as an attractive money business.

Education is the most important and basic right of an individual. It helps in training the mind of a human being and makes him perfect in every field of life. It makes a person a wise deci-

sion maker and a better citizen. Without education, an individual is not complete in this working world.

India has always had a very glorious and interesting education background. It is a way to gather information and an opportunity to learn the skills of life. But unfortunately, this sector of the country has been degraded by the profit motives of many. The government has given the guarantee of providing elementary education to each child between the age group of 6 to 14, but due to lack of funds available, it has permitted the entry of private investments in this field. And these private investors are not guided by educational motive but rather by profit motives. They have made this into a business from which they can easily earn pots and pots of money.

With the increasing need of higher education in the country, these private schools and universities have grabbed the opportunity of making money through this. They offer high level of education and more valuable degrees to students at a very high cost. The quality of the education is measured with the amount of money

you put in. The more fees you pay for a college or university, the better education you get. This has become the unfortunate mantra in India now.

With more number of people willing to go abroad for their masters and post graduation, the private schools here are increasing their fees, knowing the fact they will be able to attract students. And the government with insufficient funds to provide education is not able to put a restriction on these malpractices.

Majority of the institutions thrive on the principle of commercialization in India. The faculties teaching the subjects are not appropriate. They are weak and do not take their job seriously. In fact becoming a teacher is the last option for graduates now. The devotional feeling of imparting knowledge does not exist in today's times. Education is provided to bring out the potential in a learner. But unfortunately, in India it is viewed as a source of income rather than providing quality education. The entire basics of the Indian education system need to be revamped and all the negativity in it has to be eradicated.
