
## National Sports Day celebrated at Witty

# William Shakespeare through the Ages



Udaipur: The thirteenth Annual Conference of Rajasthan Association for Studies in English will be organized on 5-6 Nov,2016 at Dr.K.N.Modi University, Niwai, Tonk, Rajasthan on the topic William Shakespeare through the Ages.

This was decided in a meeting at Dr.K.N.Modi University, Niwai, Tonk. Vice Chancellor of the University Prof.Devendra Pathak offered to host the conference and provide all logistic support. Prof. H. S. Chandalia, Vice President of the Association told that since 2016 is the 400th year of William Shakespeare's death, this year's conference is dedicated to him. Saikat Bannerjee, Assistant Professor and Head, Department of English at Dr.K.N.Modi University shall be the Organizing Secretary of the conference. The theme of the conference is "William Shakespeare through the Ages".

William Shakespeare was born in April 1564 and passed away on May 3, 1616. The year 2016 marks the 400th year of his death. Four hundred years after his death William Shakespeare does not remain a poet and dramatist of Britain alone. He is present in almost

every country in the world. He is liked, adored, criticized and imitated but "The Bard" as people in England call him cannot be ignored in the history of letters. Ben Jonson called him:

**Soul of the age!**

The applause! Delight! The wonder of our stage!

It is difficult to find much detail about Shakespeare, the man. Many of the biographical details including the date of birth are shrouded in mystery. Nevertheless his character is perfectly well known. His personality emerges exquisitely through his writings, as is rightly said about him, "The book is the man". It is through his writings that Shakespeare has drawn millions of readers and scholars to admire him. He comes out as a lovable person, full of a deep understanding of human nature and capable of imagining characters that are not just British but universal beings in their affections and conduct.

The plays of Shakespeare are examples of English drama at its best. He took the British drama from the old styled morality plays to the great tradition of Greek tragedies and surpassing them in many ways like breaking the bound of the

three unities of drama, creating characters who are not just British but Roman, Moroccan and even indigenous like Caliban. His range is vast extending from the famous tragedies to comedies and tragic-comedies also known as romances. Equally vast is the range of the language used in his plays. The highly poetic speeches and soliloquies, wild and wanton mysteriousness of the supernatural and prosaic utterances of the plebeian characters are but a few examples of the variety of language used in his plays. The plays of Shakespeare attract the audience today also because they are, despite all the fantasy involved, real in the true sense of the term. The characters are life-like characters who exhibit essential human traits which are convincing even today, after so many years. He has created a vast variety of characters including passionate lovers, robust kings, treacherous witches, dotting wives, cruel conspirators, devoted commanders, comic clowns and even mad people. Even His plays highlight the deep seated moral wisdom of the dramatist which gets reflected through the characters. His characters may be heroic or

anti-heroic but are valued for the high moral ground of their conduct and thought. Shakespeare began his career in theatre as an actor. He later assumed several other roles including that of a manager. This made him fully acquainted with the stagecraft. In fact, one major rich attribute of Shakespeare is his knowledge of stagecraft. His command over the various facets of theatre made his company a very popular company. Under the patronage of Lord Chamberlain, it rose to be the best in England and was most frequently commanded to play before the queen. When King James came to the throne he took this company under royal patronage, attaching them to

his household and increased the frequency of their performances. The stage of Shakespearean theatre used to be a high rectangular platform with audience all around it. It was not like modern stage where the front is occupied by the audience and many things can be hidden by curtains. In Shakespeare's time the audience could see everything happening on the stage. Therefore, besides other things like music and costume, poetry was used richly to suspend any disbelief that could have emerged in the minds of the audience. His poetry is also illuminated in more than a hundred sonnets which have a stanza-pattern known after

him. Shakespeare has a global presence also through numerous translations and film adaptations of his plays. Almost every country has adopted Shakespeare in her own way. These translations make his name a household name even in those countries which hate England for political reasons. The Empire of Great Britain has left behind a legacy of Shakespeare studies which the people relish. He is present in courses and public discourses. Dramatists of the world learn from his plays even more than from the legendary Greek playwrights. In the twenty first century William Shakespeare is present in several avtaars.

## 200 year old, Dust Bin Well ,Recharged

Udaipur: In the Lokmanya Tilak B.Ed.College Dabok this well became a DUST BIN filled with rough,waste papers ,some plastic bags ,paper covers,folders. Whenever I used to go there to give my presentation either on Addition or Rain water harvesting & used to see the pathetic condition of this well I used feel very bad about it .So decided that once I would like to see this DUST BIN WELL into WATER WELL.

When the state Government allotted in year 1950 , this land to Honorable late shri Jannu Bhai ( Shri Janardan Rai Nagar) this well was there quenching the thirst of whole Dabok village .This was in existence during the times of the colonel Jems Tad when he used this building .After his death this Bangla was known as BHOOT BANGLA so people stopped going to this site .In the year 2000 this well dried up & gradually it became a DUST BIN by dumping the waste material mentioned above. This led to my constant persuasion to the Principal of the college to get it cleaned & recharged by the Roof Top rain Water. This work was of cleaning & removing the debris from well was entrusted to the staff of the college Dr.Balidan Jain who sincerely got this cleaned in the year 2008 .With this the well was deepened by digging more up to 170 feet. Now it was attached to the Roof top rain water harvesting system on which I am working since last two decades so I along with Dr.B.L.Shrimali a staff of the college went up on the roof to see the feasibility of installing the pipes for the collection of rain water from roof top .It is a old building so the collecting pipe was passed from one of the class room wall. Meanwhile the V.C.of the University Prof.S.S.Sarangdewot happen to visit the campus also requested me to get this work done before going to U.S.A. &NACC inspection .Dr Shashi Chittora the principal took very keen interest in this matter & got this work done soon under my guidance .Dr B.L.Shrimali called the local plumber whom I guided & this work of joining this well from this roof top rain water harvesting system completed in year 2015.Now we were waiting for this year 2016 rain & finally it filled this well up to the brim ,my dream came true .I hope many will follow this than there will be no shortage of water if this kind of defunct water sources(Well,Hand Pump,Borewell) are recharged .This way we saved the 200 year old heritage well which all can also do.Dr.Shashi Chittora Mob,9414785706, Dr Balidan Jain 9414272672,Dr B.L.Shrimali 9460693771

## Interventions requires improve the nutrition in State

Udaipur: India has one of the highest rates of under nutrition in the world . While stunting (children who are short for their age) has declined from 51% to 38.7% in the past 15 years (1999-2014), we still have more than 45 million stunted children in the country. At this rate of decline, it would take close to 50 years to eradicate stunting.

Sixty percent of India's burden of under nutrition is found in six low-income States (Bihar, Chhattisgarh, Jharkhand, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan, and Uttar Pradesh) . In Rajasthan, 36.5% of children under five are stunted, and 14.2% are wasted , with the malnutrition burden much higher in the tribal districts.

"On the barometer of nutritional deprivation, tribal children fare the worst among all social groups in the country. Stunting (low height for age) and wasting (low weight for height) is most common among tribal children," said Dr.Pavitra Mohan, Founder, Basic Health Care Services Trust and Director, Health Services, Aajeivika Bureau.

"In Southern Rajasthan, which has a relatively high tribal population, 61% of households are tribal (belonging to Bhil and Meena communities),



The average human development index (HDI) score of the region is 0.5, the lowest in Rajasthan,"he added.

Districts in Southern Rajasthan such as Dungarpur and Banswara have the highest burden of malnutrition. In Dungarpur, 53.48% of children below 5 years of age are stunted, while 58.67% of children below 5 years of age are stunted in Banswara .

Stunting remains more prevalent form of growth failure due to malnutrition, which results from low birth weight or chronic malnutrition and is irreversible after two years of age. Delay in paying attention to stunting not only threatens to entrap a child in a vicious intergenerational cycle of malnutrition but also manifests in lower productivity of the nation as a whole.

The other type of malnutrition - 'Micronutrient Deficiency' (including vitamin

A, iron, iodine, zinc and folic acid) - is a major factor contributing to malnutrition. Ensuring adequate micronutrient status in women of reproductive age, pregnant women and children is essential in order to maintain the health of mothers as well as the growth, development and survival of their children.

Malnutrition is not only the result of too little food, but is caused by a combination of factors: insufficient nutrition - protein and micronutrients; frequent infections or disease; poor care and infant feeding practices; inadequate health services; unsafe water and sanitation; adolescent pregnancy, lack of family planning and low social status of women.

"Preventing and treating malnutrition is complex. There are barriers presented by social and cultural norms; gender bias, availability and access to services and poverty.

Compounding these barriers is a lack of awareness about appropriate and adequate nutrition," said Ashok Alexander, Founder and Director of Antara Foundation.

Undernutrition is preventable through proven intervention.

Parents cannot improve the nutrition of their children by themselves - they need support from communities, civil society, businesses and governments, particularly in the first 1,000 days.

Focus on the right nutrients for both mother and baby in the first 1,000 days from conception to the second birthday set the stage for physical, emotional and intellectual development for a child's entire life.

In an effort to forge greater commitment to focus on nutrition, Antara Foundation is conducting a series of knowledge sharing workshops for journalists in Rajasthan, under the theme

"PoshanKePehredaar". The workshop aims to enable media to de-mystify malnutrition - its causes and prevention strategies, building public awareness and mobilize the stakeholders to be engaged in decision-making processes, and promote accountability.
