

Faculty - Journalism and Mass Communication Department discussed online on World Press Freedom Day

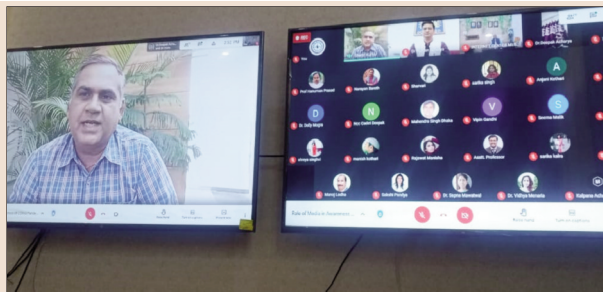
Udaipur: On Monday, Mohanlal Sukhadia University's Department of Journalism and Mass Communication has discussed online the topic "Role of Media in Corona Epidemic and Vaccination Awareness Campaign."

Chief Guest, Information Commissioner in the Government of Rajasthan, Narayan Bareth, said that the picture is disappointing due to the present-day Corona, which can help the media to overcome it.

Referring to the power of the media, he said that the media could make the hero a villain and a villain to a hero. We have to see how the underprivileged section of society defines the media. He said that journalists should not be class

media but mass media. At present, we have many challenges, the challenge of comforting the public, the challenge of getting treatment medicines to people, its challenge is to keep the morale of the public high, and its challenge that India can raise its head in the world fame. He questioned the role of the media in the Corona crisis and asked if the media asked the right questions. Did the media raise questions when experts had pointed out that the second wave of Corona would arrive in March?

Bareth said that the media is missing somewhere in it. Praising the role of the media, he said that many journalists are risking their lives and putting the suffering and suffering of people in front of



everyone; this is also making the government aware. He cited figures released by a Delhi-based organization that 100 journalists lost their lives due to the coronavirus; 50 of them sacrificed their lives in the month of April. Comparing the present situation and the time of the Spanish flu in 1918, Narayan Bareth said that in 1918 we did not have many facilities. We did not have resources, so we lost 6 per-

cent of our population. But today, we have the resources, and the need is to manage them. He said that the media could create an environment where all political parties unite and face this crisis. Narayan Bareth questioned the media's silence on the issue of migrant laborers on the streets during Lok Down. He further said that in the media, news should be written in brief, in all forms, in the style of pictures, whose light

can dictate humanity. He said that readers are in the Hindi language in India and there are more than four hundred channels.

By this, people can be educated in a much broader way. He advised the journalists to write the truth, Do not care whether the owner will benefit or harm.

He said that the journalist is like Nigehban standing on the bridge, which keeps an eye on the ships coming in the river. Sharat Kumar, the editor of the special guest news channel Aaj Tak, said that Corona has more courage than medicine.

To encourage people, success stories are reaching more and more people. It also explains the lack of government. The role of media in

Corona is important. In the media, we are not creating a panic over the lack of anything but are addressing this problem by reaching the Health Minister and the officials.

Along with this, the media is also playing the role of sharp critic. Make the government accountable by fixing accountability to the media public. In order to implement the rules and regulations of the government properly, people should also be awakened. Show how the punitive provisions are also properly implemented. Distinguished guest, Deputy Director of Public Relations Department, Dr. Deepak Acharya, said that the current phase is a period of asymmetry and humanitarian sentiment.

Media is playing its role,

which is an encouraging sign. In the border areas, including Jaisalmer, the media has mobilized people through the success story. Information and Public Relations Department is also very active, and people are being made aware through all the publicity. Program President Mohanlal Sukhadia University Vice-Chancellor Professor Amarika Singh said that the contribution of media in Corona and vaccination awareness is invaluable.

Whatever information we are getting during the epidemic is being received through the media.

ANIL AGARWAL PLEDGES RS. 150 CRORE TO SUPPORT GOVT IN TACKLING NATIONAL HEALTH EMERGENCY



- Vedanta to create additional capacity of 1,000 hospital beds pan India
- Critical care beds to be placed in state-of-the-art 'field hospitals' across 10 locations
- Latest pledge of Rs 150 crore is in addition to Rs 201 crore contribution made last year to combat COVID
- Vedanta business units supporting 700 Covid beds, to increase number of beds to 1,000

New Delhi: Mr. Anil Agarwal, Chairman of Vedanta, India's leading producer of metals and oil & gas, has pledged Rs. 150 Cr to help the country in its fight against the rapidly spreading second wave of Covid 19. This is over and above Rs. 201 Cr that was spent by the Vedanta group last year.

In an effort to support the tremendous efforts being made by the Government of India and State governments, Vedanta Ltd will create additional capacity of 1,000 critical care beds in 10 cities pan-India. The critical care beds will be placed in state-of-the-art 'field hospitals' which will be attached to recognized and reputed hospitals. Each facility will have 100 beds in an air-conditioned tent with full electrical support and designed specifically for Covid care. The critical care facilities will have 90 beds equipped with oxygen support while the remaining will have ventilator support.

Speaking on the initiative, Mr. Anil Agarwal, Chairman, Vedanta, said, "I am deeply concerned and anguished to see the impact of the second wave of Covid-19 and loss of precious lives. Vedanta group has come forward to pledge Rs 150 Cr towards our commitment to fight the pandemic and we stand firmly with our people and the government at this difficult time. We believe that this additional infrastructure that will be set up immediately will bring much-needed relief for those affected by this deadly virus. Vedanta will also provide essential medical equipment for our heroic doctors and healthcare workers. We will continue to do everything possible that will help us together overcome this crisis."

The states where the additional capacity of critical care beds will be created are Rajasthan, Odisha, Chhattisgarh, Jharkhand, Goa, Karnataka and Delhi NCR. The company has set a target for the first set of facilities to be ready and commissioned within 14 days and balance facilities will be augmented within 30 days. Vedanta has estimated this support for a minimum 6-month period.

Vedanta is working closely with the government bodies and local administration to provide medical facilities and hospital care to those in need. The company is currently supporting around 700 beds for Covid patients across its business locations, which will be increased to 1,000 in the near term.

Meanwhile, Hindustan Zinc (HZL), ESL, and Sesa Goa Iron Ore Business have stepped in to augment oxygen supplies to Covid-19 patients as part of the Vedanta Cares initiative. HZL is currently supplying 5T (100 percent of Liquid Oxygen capacity) of oxygen per day which can be used for medical treatment and is in the process of increasing it by another 2-3T. Sesa Goa Iron Ore Business is supplying 3T of Liquid Medical Oxygen (LMO) daily to the Goa State Government and hospitals, while ESL, the Vedanta group's steelmaker, has registered its plant near Bokaro for LMO and has committed to supply up to 10T of oxygen daily.

Sterlite Copper has received approval from the Supreme Court to supply oxygen from its Tuticorin plant. Sterlite Copper's oxygen plants have a capacity to produce 1,000 tonnes of oxygen daily. Vedanta is in talks with producers to procure the vaccines in bulk for our employees and their families. So far, over 5,000 employees and family members have been vaccinated and we would cover the whole of the Vedanta family and our business partners in the coming days.

company has rolled out a telemedicine program for Nand Ghar communities with a 'Doctor on call' facility in Rajasthan, Odisha, Chhattisgarh, Jharkhand, Karnataka, and UP. It has also set up a 24/7 dedicated helpline with Apollo Hospital to provide medical assistance to all employees and their families. Last year, Vedanta had contributed Rs 201 crore in the wake of the Covid crisis. This included a contribution to the PM-CARES Fund and Vedanta's commitment of catering to three specific areas—the livelihood of the daily wage workers across the nation, preventive health care, and support to all its employees and contract partners across its plant locations.

This will help thousands of Corona infected and needy people struggling with breathing problems. Secure meter donated five oxygen plants

Udaipur: According to the state government's instructions, all kinds of better arrangements are being made to deal with the corona epidemic in the Udaipur division. In the same series, 5 Oxygen Generation Plants being donated by Secure Meter, an industrial institute in Udaipur, will be set up soon for better arrangements of oxygen supply to the Corona infect-

ed in the hospitals.

Divisional Commissioner Rajendra Bhatt informed that five PSA-type oxygen plants are being set up at Nathdwara, Banswara, Bhilwara, including Udaipur Division Headquarters for medical oxygen supply to covid infected by Secure Meter, Udaipur. Under this, these plants will be set up at M.B. Hospital in Udaipur, ESIC Hospital, Ananta Hospital in Nathdwara, Government M.G. Hospital in Banswara, and Government M.G. Hospital in Bhilwara. Secure Meter Management has told that 3 to 4 plants will reach Udaipur between 9 to 11 May this month. This will go a long way in providing medical oxygen supply to the covid infected.

These oxygen plants are like this: In a letter sent to Divisional Commissioner Bhatt, Suket Singhal, MD of Secure Meter, said that during the covid epidemic, the institute has decided to donate five PSA-type oxygen generating systems for covid infected under CSR. These oxygen plants will be imported from abroad, which will be equipped with modern facilities including molecular suture, touch screen HMI. This will provide great relief to covid infected patients, hospitals, and district administration. These oxygen plants will be installed in hospitals only. The secure meter will also bear the expenses incurred on their installation. He has told that it is his endeavor that between 9 to 11 May, 3 to 4 plants reach Udaipur; for this, they are constantly in contact with the supplier. Due to uncertainty regarding international flights, it may be delayed by a day or two.

More than 50 beds will be supplied oxygen from one plant: Additional Divisional Commissioner L.N. Mantri informed that according to the information received from the Secure Meter, an oxygen plant could be set up in a 12 x 15 square foot area. A total of 716 kg. APSA-type oxygen plant weighing more than 50 beds will be able to supply oxygen, with a flow rate of 10 normal cubic meters per hour, while oxygen purity - USP of 93 percent. Outlet pressure of oxygen plant - 4.5 kg. It will be per square cm.

UCCI set up a second camp in seven days to achieve 100% vaccination target in

Industrial areas

Udaipur: The vaccination camp started in the Chamber building of Udaipur Chamber of Commerce and Industry from today.

Chairman Shri Komal Kothari said that the purpose of organizing the camp is to provide first or second vaccine facilities free of cost to the entrepreneurs, staff, and their families in the industrial area. Chairman Komal Kothari informed that UCCI is committed to meet the target of 100% vaccination in all industrial units and commercial establishments.

Honorary General Secretary Dr. Anshu Kothari said that to achieve 100 percent vaccination, the second vaccination camp is being organized by the Udaipur Chamber of Commerce and Industry in the UCCI Chamber Building within just one week. On the first day of the two-day camp today, 109 persons were vaccinated, in which 37 were given the first and 72 were vaccinated with the second dose. Both covaccine and covidShield are being vaccinated in the camp. Chairman Shri Komal Kothari informed that banners and posters had been installed by UCCI in industries and commercial establishments located in Madri industrial area to create awareness to control corona infection by vaccination and through other means. Employees working in industry and business are motivated to get vaccinated and adopt safety measures to protect against covid-19. Industry owners have also been requested to get all their employees vaccinated as necessary. The UCCI has suggested to all employers that every possible effort should be made to vaccinate all employees to meet the target of 100% vaccination. Make the employee aware of immunization by informing them about the safety of immunization.

Dr. Ajit Singh performed complex brain hemorrhage in the hospital

Udaipur: 56-year-old Jassi Yohannan's brain surgery was performed without fainting. Dr. Manish Kulshrestha (Senior Neuro physician) said that Jassi was feeling numb on the face for the last three days along with difficulty in speaking. For this reason, he was brought to the hospital. MRI And other tests done, it was found that hemorrhage has occurred in the left part of the brain. The patient was previously suffering from diabetes, hypothyroid, and breast cancer. The patient's tumor was on the speaking part of the brain. Because of this, the emergency operation was done using the new technique called Awake Surgery.

The patient was referred to the hospital's senior neurosurgeon Dr. Ajit Singh for surgery. Doctors Ajit Singh and Dr. Manish Kulshrestha explained to the family about the tumor and its available treatment. They were told how to perform brain surgery and remove the tumor, and during this operation, patients will not become completely unconscious, but by keeping them in consciousness and talking to them, the surgery will be completed. Dr. Singh said that we had numbered the patient's head first by injecting it and then started operating it; we kept talking to the patient and carried out the surgery during this time. After doing this, Dr. Ajit Singh said that there are many millions of nerves in the patient's brain, and when they are operated on in the speaking area, it is unknown which patient is harming by cutting which vein. In this technique, there is no such harm due to the operation while talking to the patient. And the success rate of the patient's procedure also increases.

Now the patient is very healthy and is talking to everyone. In addition to Dr. Ajit Singh in the operation team, Dr. Nitin Kaushik (Anesthesia Specialist) had exceptional support. On this occasion, Mr. Vishwajeet Kumar, Hospital Director, said that patient safety is our first objective. Paras J. K. The hospital is committed to providing all medical and surgical emergency support to the patients, even in this epidemic.
