Golden show in Tokyo

The stunning throw of 87.58 metres, with which Neeraj Chopra won the javelin throw gold at the Tokyo Olympics made Saturday India's best day ever in their Olympics journey — wrestler Bajrang Punia had won bronze less than an hour before Chopra threw the javelin past 87 metres on his first two attempts. Chopra's medal, India's second gold in an individual event in all Olympics, took our haul from the Tokyo Olympics to seven. The previous best was six at London 2012, while the previous individual gold came in 2008, from shooter Abhinav Bindra. India's shooters, who went to Tokyo with high hopes, returned empty-handed from their second consecutive Olympics after medalling in three Olympics in a row from 2004 — if they had performed to potential, India's medal count would have passed 10.

Chopra's gold, India's first medal ever in athletics - Norman Pritchard won two silver at Paris in 1900 while representing India, but

he was a British citizen — is rightly being hailed as historic for it was won in a mainstream sport that demands a very high degree of athleticism, strength and technical finesse. Before Chopra arrived on the scene, the hope of India winning an Olympics track and field medal — let alone gold! seemed an impossible dream. The performance by the hockey teams was exceptional, too, with the men winning bronze to end a 41-year drought. The silver won by Ravi Dahiya and Mirabai Chanu and the bronze by PV Sindhu—the first Indian woman to win medals in two Olympics — were just rewards of great performances.

The most pleasing aspect of India's show was that the circle of India's competitiveness expanded, if ever so slightly, in Tokyo. Aditi Ashok was in contention for a golf medal until the very end; fencer Bhavani Devi and Fouaad Mirza in equestrian impressed, too. All in all, the festival of sport went off pretty well, despite an alarming surge in Covid-19 cases in Tokyo. Crucially, the pre-Olympics horror scenario, as projected by Japan's doctors and health experts, was averted. Over time, we'll know the cost to Japan's economy for holding the Olympics during the pandemic. For now, let's celebrate our and the world's exceptional athletes.

GETTY AWARDED GRANT FOR CURATORIAL INNOVATION IN PRINTS AND DRAWINGS

Grants made as part of The Paper Project feature diverse and understudied collections

Nineteen new grants totaling over \$1.55 million will support exhibitions, publications and digital projects that center the graphic arts as part of the Getty Foundation's ongoing Paper Project initiative.

Prints and drawings are an unsung area of curatorial innovation and a place for museums to bring new forms of storytelling to their permanent collections. Launched in 2018, The Paper Project funds professional development and experimental projects for curators around the world who study prints and drawings to make graphic arts collections more accessible and relevant to 21st-century audiences.

The Getty Foundation awarded The Paper Project grant to The City Palace Museum, Maharana of Mewar Charitable Foundation (MMCF) for an exhibition and publication on 18th - to 20th century maps and landscapes from Udaipur, India and the project curator is Dr. Shailka Mishra from Hyderabad.Mapmaking has been a part of the visual repertoire of Udaipur since the 1700s, as court artists of the Mewar dynasty regularly depicted real-world buildings and terrain says Bhupendra Singh Auwa, Administrator in Chief, MMCF. With the advent of colonial cartography under the British, these methods underwent radical change and new technologies were introduced. Showcasing works from

the City Palace Museum's never-before-exhibited collection of 2,000 maps, architectural drawings, and landscape views, an exhibition and catalogue will examine artistic representations of the "City of Lakes" alongside topographical maps and plans. Together, these media provide an opportunity for guest curator Shailka Mishra to study and present shifts in the visualization of architecture and landscape over more than two centuries, tracing how Udaipur artists responded to transformations in cartographic prac-

include prints and drawings are the lifeblood of museums, archives and libraries," says Heather MacDonald, senior program officer at the Getty Foundation. "As the cultural sector moves into post-pandemic rebuilding, institutions have a tremendous opportunity to refocus on their own holdings while they also invest in the professional growth of their staff. These grants provide the resources needed to take a deep dive into seldomseen collections and develop creative and relatable ways to display works on paper in galleries, in print and also online."

The curatorial projects represent collections of prints and drawings created across more than a millennium and dozens of countries. They also demonstrate the wide range of works on paper that exist, including personal travel journals, political posters, illuminated manuscripts, architectural plans

and maps, woodcuts, acidbased etchings and more. Participating curators have chosen a variety of in-gallery and digital solutions to present these objects in fresh and com-

Many grant projects will focus on understudied techniques, collections and artists. At the Chrysler Museum of Art in Norfolk, Virginia, curator Kimberli Gant is investigating the history and legacy of printmaking on the African continent in relation to an understudied body of work from one of America's foremost modern printmakers, Jacob Lawrence. Gant's scholarship is culminating in an exhibition about Lawrence's prints inspired by travels to Nigeria and his interactions with the Mbari Club, a network of artists, writers and musicians that emerged from the socio-political upheaval across West Africa.

Anumber of grants support digital-only projects that are using technology to turn challenges in research or display into opportunities.

and Behavioural Changes for UMC and **City Officials**

Udaipur: Udaipur Municipal Corporation (UMC) and City Officials received training on aspects of Social and Behavior Change (SBC) from lens of young children and their families. The workshop series was designed by John Hopkins-Centre for Communication Programs and supported by Bernard van Leer Foundation, an independent foundation working towards early childhood development. The aim of this initiative was to support city officials in incorporating behaviour change into the design, planning, and management of projects and programmes from the lens of 0-5-year-old children, under the global Urban95 initiative.

The capacity strengthening workshop was conducted virtually over a period of four weeks with 3-hour weekly sessions. The participants were introduced to Urban95 program, a multivear initiative between the Udaipur Municipal Corporation and the Netherland-based Bernard van Leer Foundation focused on incorporating the lens of young children and their families in city planning and design. This was followed by four deep dive sessions on relevant SBC concepts - Human centred design, gender and SBC and monitoring and evaluation methods and tools. These sessions will sharpen participants' understanding of SBC taking them one step ahead from the basics and provide them necessary tools to apply in their area of work. The workshop sessions were interactive and engaging, where participants could focus on the behavioral challenges vis-à-vis their respective city level interventions, share their experiences and learn from the course directors as well as other participants.

It was attended by UMC officials including Mahendra Samdani - Executive Engineer, UMC & of Udaipur Smart City Ltd. (USCL),
