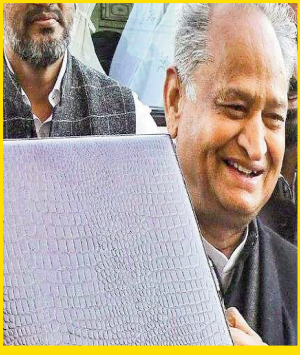

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Why is the Opposition Trying to Tarnish Amritkal?

Prime Minister Narendra Modi and his government emphasizes on AmritKaal, they have laid the foundation of 'New India', 'Strong India', which will be realized in 2047, the hundredth year of its independence. The recently presented budget underlines the 'AmritKaal' in the best possible way. The strategies and plans of the government are also being made keeping the same in the centre. But it is a big irony that the entire opposition is in the dark about Amritkal.

The responsible role of the opposition is being expected in making the AmritKaal nectar, but this is not going to happen, as it has repeatedly exposed its directionlessness, this has become clear in the budget session. What kind of politics is this, what kind of demonstration of the responsibilities of the opposition, in which the interests of the people and the amritkaal are being neglected in the name of building a new India in the name of baking bread for their political interests.

A burning question has emerged in front of Indian democracy that whether Indian politics has become without opposition? The opposition is completely disintegrated and is looking so weak and languid

that the possibilities of a strong or solid political alternative are almost dead. Not only this, the opposition has not only become political, it has also become policy less? This is the reason why in the political journey reaching the occasion of Amrit Mahotsav, the condition of the opposition has never been so sluggish, worse and extinct. Such an environment is a challenge and an irony for democracy. If considered from this point of view, the behaviour of the opposition in India at the national level or in many states is disappointing. Opposition parties and leaders want to defeat BJP, want to weaken Modi's ever-strengthening image and position, but are unable to understand on which issues to fight and go among the public. Neither do they have effective issues nor do they have the ability to present the issues effectively. They will not be able to follow the religion of the opposition by proving the BJP as anti-Brahmins or anti-Dalit-backward, or by targeting the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh or unnecessarily suspecting industrialists like Adani.

Opposition MPs have proved that they neither have anything meaningful to say nor listen to, by continuously raising slogans during the

Prime Minister's address. The opposition MPs may have had some reasons for their din, but they proved the Prime Minister's statement that one is costing many more with their irritating sloganeering. Once upon a time minorities like Muslims, Christians used to be polarized by creating fear against Sangh and BJP. A group of backward and Dalits were lured by calling them advocates of the upper caste.

Where is the effective opposition, where are the issues of national interest. The efforts of the opposition seem to be to prove the BJP, the Sangh and the Prime Minister as well-wishers of industrialists, anti-Muslims-Dalits-tribals and supporters of the upper castes. Will the opposition be able to weaken the BJP on the basis of these issues? It is India's misfortune that the major group of the present opposition still fails to understand the positive changes and development taking place in the country. For this reason, the opposition party and its leaders want to take politics where India has gone far ahead. In spite of the BBC report on Gujarat riots at all costs and despite the entire opposition making it an issue, let alone non-Muslims, even ordinary Muslims were not



seen coming forward aggressively against the BJP. Why? What is the meaning of calling Ramcharitmanas anti-lower castes in Bihar and Uttar Pradesh? Now India is focusing on development by coming out of such narrow and communal urges, disputes of religion, caste, class, language, the people of the country and minority communities also want development, want to see India becoming powerful.

Common people have understood that if India has to become a major economic power of the world, then our industrialists will play an important role in it. That's why the public is not agitated even after all the efforts of the opposition's conspiracies and conspiracies to make Modi tainted in the name of Adani. The opposition has also failed to



convince the public that public interest or public sector banks' investments are at risk because of the Adani group. If anything is clear from the way the opposition is presenting the case of Adani Group, it is that it has found another case like the purchase of Rafale fighter jets and the Pegasus espionage episode to surround the government. This case also fizzled out like Raphael and Pegasus.

Modi's address in the recent budget-session is a slap on the opposition, Modi gave much advice to the opposition in the currency of teaching a lesson to the children, but it is difficult to say that the opposition will pay attention to any advice of the Prime Minister, but he said it right. The more mud you throw, the more the lotus will bloom. It would be better if the

opposition realizes that lies have no legs.

The way the opposition tried to focus the discussion on the motion of thanks on the President's address to the Adani group, the Prime Minister failed it first in the Lok Sabha and then in the Rajya Sabha. By not saying anything directly on the questions of the opposition in this matter, he gave the same message that the government cannot be surrounded on this issue. Because today due to Hindutva and Hindutva-centric nationalism, there has been some practical and positive transformation in the power and politics of the country.

Economic-social-cultural development and extensive works on the front of defence-security-science, education-medical have changed the

ground reality, the country has become empowered, control of terrorism and violence has created an atmosphere of peace and tranquility among the people.

Where are the incidents of terrorist and violence happening every day in Jammu and Kashmir now? Recurring terrorist attacks, communal violence in the country, where is it now? Apart from the narrow politics of the opposition, the scene of outcry is not visible anywhere. Rahul Gandhi himself gave speeches against the government in Bharat Jodo Yatra, but no movement was seen anywhere, he had to say that there is peace in the country. The truth cannot be covered with false facts and theories for long. Today, under the leadership of Narendra Modi, the BJP is holding power at the Centre with a majority, so the reason for this is that the thinking of the general public has changed to a great extent, it supports the politics of integration instead of the politics of division.

It should not only be about the opposition, it should not only be about defeating Modi, but it should also be about the country, it should be about making AmritKaal a medium for the country's development, only then the opposition will

be able to rise above its plight. If he opens doors to some new possibilities, shows the way to solve all the problems of the country and society, presents a roadmap to curb inflation, poverty, illiteracy, ill health, unemployment and crimes, then his acceptability will automatically increase. If the opposition is concerned about business, economy, unemployment, inflation, rural life and poor condition of farmers, then it should be visible. But the opposition, instead of becoming a challenge to the government either at the centre or the state level, seems to be engaged only in saving itself. He is fighting the battle of his identity but is not able to develop in himself the strong will and eligibility to oust the ruling party. Congress made serious efforts to establish the importance of money above 'public importance' in Indian democracy, the consequences of which it has to bear. Can the Congress or other opposition parties become a light in these odd and dark conditions, can they play an important role in Amritkal, can they be ready to fulfill their meaningful role; if the opposition does not perform its meaningful and effective role firmly, then there is darkness ahead for it.

Gulabchand Kataria became the Governor of Assam

Udaipur: Gulabchand Kataria, MLA from Udaipur City and Leader of the Opposition in the Rajasthan Legislative Assembly, has been made the Governor of Assam.

On the appointment of Gulabchand Kataria as the Governor, his fans and BJP leaders across the state, including Udaipur, have expressed happiness. Senior BJP leaders have called and congratulated Kataria. At the same time, Kataria said that he had no such expectation. However, two days back, PM Narendra Modi called him to inquire about his well-being, but there was no discussion about making him a governor.

Earlier, former chief minister of Rajasthan and former MLA from Udaipur, late Mohanlal Sukhadia, Congress leader late Sadiq Ali, a senior leader of Jansangh Sundar Singh Bhandari, and former director of RAW, Arvind Dave of Udaipur have also adorned the post of Governor.

Udaipur City BJP's politics has heated up with the announcement of making city MLA Gulabchand Kataria the governor.

Kataria has won 6 times from the city seat and has been a continuous MLA for the last 20 years. The city seat will fall vacant if he goes to Assam as governor. However, due to less than a year remaining in the assembly elections, there is no possibility of by-elections.

In these circumstances, the leaders of Kataria's supporters and opponents of the camp, who have been staking their claims for the city till now, have

started brawling openly, and political manipulations have intensified.

Among them are Deputy Mayor Paras Singhvi, City BJP District

Advisor to Governor Kalraj Mishra and member of the former Mewar royal family, Dr. Lakshyaraj Singh Mewar's ever-increasing proximity to the

Rules for the vacant seat in 6 months, condition if less than a year is left in the election, a by-election is unnecessary.

After Kataria joins as the governor, whether there will be a by-election for the city seat arises. The simple answer is - no. The reason is that usually, when the seat of an MP or MLA is vacant, by-elections are held within 6 months under the provisions of the Representation of the People Act, 1951. Section 151-A of the same law provides that if the tenure of such MP or MLA is less than one year, there will be no by-election. The term of

why there is no scope for a by-election on this seat.

Political experts are now seeing the State BJP divided into factions of former CM Vasundhara Raje, State President Dr. Satish Poonia, Leader of Opposition Kataria, and Union Minister Gajendra Singh Shaktawat. Now it will be interesting to see how the BJP will fill the Leader of Opposition Kataria vacancy in Udaipur. Janata Sena patron Randhir Singh Bhinder, considered a staunch political opponent of Leader of Opposition Kataria, has made several unsuccessful attempts to bring former CM Raje into the BJP.

In such a situation, it will be interesting to see whether Raje will be able to bring Bhinder to BJP or

JAR started a statewide campaign to raise the voice of journalist interest

Udaipur: On behalf of the Journalists Association of Rajasthan (JAR), from Tuesday, in the interest of journalists across the state, the announcements included in the Congress manifesto and the announcements approved in the cabinet, to be handed over letters urging cooperation from the MLAs of various assembly constituencies. The campaign has been launched.

JAR state president Subhash Sharma and state general secretary Bhag Singh said that the state executive and district-tehsil units, including the outgoing state president Rakesh Kumar Sharma and outgoing state general secretary Sanjay Saini, have asked the MLAs of their respective areas to implement the announcements of journalistic interest. Under the campaign of handing over letters of request for cooperation, the Jar delegation in Jodhpur and Udaipur handed over letters to the MLAs and urged them to raise their voice in the interest of journalists.

The Jodhpur unit on Tuesday handed over a memorandum to City MLA Manisha Panwar to implement the Journalist Protection Act included in the Congress manifesto, benefiting journalists from the housing scheme, allotting land to registered journalist associations and simplifying the advertisement policy of newspapers and journalist authorization rules.

There has been a demand to recommend the announcements etc., to be implemented by passing a resolution in the upcoming budget session.

In the memorandum given by the delegation of Czar's State Vice President Suresh Pareek, President of Jodhpur District Unit Syed Munawar Ali and Organization Minister Rajesh Sharma, etc., it has been told that before the assembly elections, Congress has made five announcements related to journalist welfare in its public manifesto.

As soon as the government was formed, these announcements were also approved by the cabinet, but it is to be told with regret that not even a single announcement could be fulfilled in the last four years. The Journalist Protection Act and the



Journalist Housing Scheme related to the safety and life of journalists also could not materialize. The advertisement policy of newspapers and the rules of journalist authorization could not be simplified. The rules for allotment of land to the registered journalist associations could not be made, nor did the concerned department contact the association for allotment of land. A year ago, the state government constituted more than half a dozen state-level journalist committees, but regular meetings of these committees are not being held, due to which no decision is being taken on the announcements related to the welfare of journalists. UDH secretary Kunjilal Meena's attitude is not positive in the meetings of Journalist Housing Committee.

Due to obstruction, the rules and regulations of Journalist Housing Scheme could not be decided in one year, nor could any housing scheme come into existence in any district of the state.

Same is the case with the announcement of the Journalist Protection Act. Its draft is said to be ready, but it is not being presented in the assembly in four years. Same is the case with other announcements. There is anger in the journalist society across the state due to not having a single announcement, especially on the Journalist Protection Act and Journalist Housing Scheme.

Although in four years, the Chief Minister has made commendable decisions like giving Samman Nidhi to senior journalists, implementing digital policy, increasing the number of advertisements in newspapers, financial assistance of Rs. Even

after the Journalist Protection Act and Journalist Housing Scheme are not implemented, there is anger in the journalist community. In Jaipur, journalists have been waging a Gandhian agitation for the Journalist Housing Scheme for two months. At present also five journalists are going to CMR every day and giving memorandum to the Chief Minister. Journalists in other districts are also in the mood for agitation.

Memorandum submitted to Udaipur Rural MLA Meena

In Udaipur, JAR's Udaipur unit, under the leadership of JAR State President Subhash Sharma, handed over a request letter to Udaipur Rural MLA Phool Singh Meena for his cooperation in becoming the voice of journalists.

He was told that Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot is taking suggestions from all organizations, society, and institutions regarding the upcoming budget session. Memorandums have been sent to the Chief Minister, Chief Secretary, Finance Secretary, DIPR Secretary and Director to implement the announcements of journalist interests by the Czar. Everyone has been urged in the letters to draw the Chief Minister's attention to the announcements for the welfare of journalists and provide cooperation to fulfill them.

Udaipur Rural MLA Meena assured cooperation in raising the voice of journalist interests. JAR State Senior Vice President Kaushal Mundra, JAR Udaipur District President Rakesh Sharma Rajdeep, District General Secretary Dinesh Bhatt, District Co-Treasurer Dinesh Hada etc. were included in the delegation.
