After becoming IAS, he was posted in Udaipur after serving as Director of the Agricultural Marketing Board and District Collector in Chittorgarh.

This is Mission Kotra for which he got the honor:

The Collector started Mission Kotra to remove the shortcomings of the remote and backward tribal block Kotra of Udaipur district and create awareness among the ordinary people to get full benefits of the government schemes. Under the mission, 2016 children of 1096 families left out in the block benefit from linking them to the Palanhar Yojana

by setting up village-to-village camps. Arrangements for education, medicine, drinking water, employment, self-employment training, transport, agricultural and forest products marketing, irrigation, etc., were ensured.

Similarly, in Kotra block,

2814 persons are being given pension facilities, 217 underprivileged persons are being given disability certificates, and 27 are being given the benefit of social security schemes by issuing silicosis certificates. The state of Gujarat gave Ring connectivity to provide uninterrupted internet service to provide benefits of government schemes.

Approval was given for establishing a total of 103 towers of BSNL for a better network; the land was also allotted for 47 new buildings.

Udaipur: Chief Minister Shri Ashok Gehlot has resolved that employment should be made available to more and more state youth, and every person can support his family by getting work in some form or the other. In this series, the state government has implemented Chief Minister Yuva Sambal Yojana. Through this, unemployed youth get monthly allowance through government office internships. This scheme has not only helped in government work, but temporary employment has also been available to many people.

Jyoti Pahuja, a resident of Hiran Magri Sector 5 of Girwa tehsil of Udaipur, was also looking for employment. When she



got information about Chief Minister Yuva Sambal Yojana, she applied on E-Mitra. After proper investigation, her application was approved, and for an internship, she was allotted the office of the Additional Director, Pension and Pensioners' Welfare Department, Udaipur. She started training last year on April 8, 2022; since then, he has been getting an allowance of Rs 4500 monthly. By doing

this work, she has not only got an opportunity to understand the nuances of government work but can also support her family with the allowance. She has said this is an essential scheme in economic empowerment, for which the Chief Minister expresses gratitude to Ashok Gehlot.

Notably, the Chief Minister Yuva Sambal Yojana implemented to provide relief to unemployed youth has been implemented effectively in Udaipur, and Udaipur district has reached the number one rank in the state. Unemployment allowance is being paid on time to the eligible unemployed. Under the scheme, Rs 4000 per month is being paid to the male unemployed and Rs 4500 per month to the female, transgender, specially-abled (disabled) unemployed, due to which the youth are getting a lot of relief

This exciting spectacle of tribal culture is witnessed in the Krishna Heritage village, 12 km from Kohima, the capital of the northeastern Indian state of Nagaland, when they celebrate their most popular Hornbill festival in the first week of December. This occasion is the foundation day of the state of Nagaland, when the state was formed on December 1 1963 The specialty is that today this festival has become so popular that tourists from all over the world come to see it and participate in the festival.

Initiated by the State Department of Tourism, Art, and Culture, Government of

Nagaland in the year 2000, this festival is celebrated along with cultural events of music and dance of the Nagas, as well as traditional sports, martial arts, archery, wrestling, fashion and beauty pageants, handicrafts, their Fragrance emanates from the Fragrance of the lifestyle, costumes, ornaments, and food, etc. The exhibition displays paintings, sculptures, wood carvings, handicraft items, and more. It is an excellent opportunity for the tourists involved in the festival to buy handicrafts here. The war dance of the Nagas is a martial and athletic dance style in which the dancers' balance is made by sight. Naga men usually perform the Warrior dance. Their other leading dance is the Zeliang dance, in which women participate. Artists wear ornaments made of metal. The chanting, clapping, foot tapping, shouting, and traditional costumes in the dance combine to create a mesmerizing atmosphere

curved, and shiny birds. The hornbill bird is widely mentioned in the mythology and songs of the Nagas. It has also been declared as the state bird. It is considered a sacred and good luck bird. The coming new year will be promising and fruitful by organizing the festival and its religious rituals.

The government's primary objective behind starting the festival is to introduce the Naga tribes to each other, introduce the country and the world to the culture of the

Naga society, encourage connectivity among the various tribes of Nagaland, and promote harmony among diverse cultures. Significantly, Nagaland has been a victim of unrest and violence for a long time. This festival has effectively brought the misguided youth here on the right path and maintained mutual peace here. The state of Nagaland hums with the beautiful hills and the melodious music of the rivers flowing here. Nestled in the foothills of the Himalayas, this region is full of natural beauty, exciting history, and fantastic culture. A nominal fee is charged for entry into the festival. The Hornbill Festival offers a colorful mix of dance, perfor-

International tourists must register at the Foreigner's Registration Office in the district, and domestic tourists will need an Inner-Line Permit from the local government. Dimapur railway station has regular and frequent trains from Kolkata and Guwahati, so rail travel can also be considered.

Kaamrup Express from Howrah Junction to Dimapur can be considered. From here, one can reach Kohima by bus or taxi. There are regular buses for Kohima by interstate tourist bus from Dimapur and Guwahati The venue of the festival is 12 km from Kohima. There are hotels for every budget and suitable food arrangements for staying in Kohima. Tourists must also plan to visit Kohima City. Kohima is the best place to spend a relaxing holiday surrounded by natural beauty. majestic hills, and serene views. Some of Kohima's most visited tourist places include Shilloi Lake, Naga Heritage Village, Kohima Zoo, Kohima Museum, and Khonoma Village.

India Denmark Water Management International Workshop Concluded

Udaipur: The two-day Ayde River basin water management workshop organized at Vidya Bhavan Polytechnic, under the ongoing works under the Green Strategic Cooperation between the Governments of India and Denmark and the mutual partnership agreement between Udaipur Municipal Corporation and Aarhus Municipal Corporation of Denmark, concluded on Thursday. Under the chairmanship of Himani Lohar, a student of Government Higher Secondary School, village Thur, experts



from the country and abroad seriously discussed the scientific contribution of teenagers, young and elderly citizens in the overall management of water sources in the Ayad River basin.

The workshop was organized with Vidya Bhavan, the Embassy of Denmark, the University of Copenhagen, the Danish Hydrological Institute, and the Development Alternative. The Citizen Science Insight leaflet was released on occasion.

Convenor Polytechnic Principal Dr. Anil Mehta said that measuring rainfall, groundwater level, and water quality has started in each part by dividing the Ayad river basin into twenty-five parts (micro watershed). This has increased my understanding of water status and climate change.

Dr. Anitha K Sharma, Senior Officer, Embassy of Denmark, initially informed me about the work under Indo-Denmark cooperation. He said that the public scientific model of Udaipur will

give a new direction to the entire state, country, and world.

Famous scientist Dr. Carsten of Denmark said that he is happy with the scientific talent of the youth of Udaipur. At the

happy with the scientific talent of the youth of Udaipur. At the same time, the connection of ordinary citizens with water sources is inspiring.

In the presidential address, student Himani Lohar said that

it is an exemplary initiative to involve the teenagers and youth of Udaipur in measuring rainfall, groundwater level, water quality, and environmental health of Udaipur. This measurement is being used in state-of-the-art modeling of water management.

In the workshop, former chief city planner Satish Shrimali, University of Copenhagen's Tryne Enmark, hydrology modeling expert K Prabhu, Kuldeep Pareta, geology expert Ravi Sharma, Lake Conservation Committee Secretary Dr. Tej Razdan, environmentalist Kushal Rawal, stepwell patron Sunil Laddha, Geetanjali Institute Of Technology Prof. Dr. Sangeeta Chowdharv. Head of Department, Aravali Institute of Technology, Dr. Sachin Sharma, Manager, ICLAI South Asia, Bhupendra Salodia, Botanist, Dr. Anita Jain, Advisor to DA, K. Vijay Lakshmi, Associate Vice President, Geetika Goswami, Research Scholars, Tanya Issar, Nidhi Sehrawat, Dr. Yogita Dashora, Pankaj Saini, rainwater conservator Mahesh Garhwal, lake lover Drupad Singh kept their views. Sadhvi Pranshushri and Dr. Vandana Mehta held lectures. While giving information about climate change, Sudheer Shetty said that society has to come forward, and the common man has to take responsibility and limit consumption.

Dr. Vandana Mehta also presented the address of Sadhvi Pranashree. He explained in detail the thinking of Mahatma Gandhi from the perspective of Indian philosophy.Sandeep Sharma said that we have to limit the use of our resources, know the earth's secrets, and use the resources in a balanced manner. He said that we have to co-exist with nature.On this occasion, Chaitanya Sanghani said that we could save nature and the earth only by adopting nature's traditional lifestyle. Famous neurologist Dr. Sudhir Shah told the secret of happiness: if we want to be happy, we can be satisfied. We must embrace the joy of giving and emphasize that the sense of satisfaction and unhappiness is hidden within us.

Sushma Singhvi emphasized non-violence and said that earth is life and life is earth, and we can co-exist only with the spirit of cooperation and giving. Dr. R.M. Pandya noted that we could protect nature and the environment only by cooperating with nature and using resources appropriately. A separate parallel session was also organized for the research students in which articles about saving the earth, nature, and the environment were presented. Kanakji Madrecha spoke from Dubai about the activities of his World Peace Association, which operates in fifty countries and has over 200 members. ISRO scientist Dr. Harish Seth expressed his views on the impact of climate change on the earth and humans.
