Unveiling of the statue of Former Minister Late Mr. Khemraj Katarea

Udaipur: Chief Minister Mr Ashok Gehlot unveiled the statue of former minister Late Mr. Khemraj Katarea at the Satellite Hospital premises in Udaipur on Monday. Addressing the gathering after the unveiling ceremony, he said that the Late Mr Katarea dedicated his life to the service of tribals and the poor. During the drought, he provided relief by providing drinking water facilities to the rural population. The Chief Minister stated that Late Mr Katarea had created a distinct identity in the public's mind through his humble personality and public service.

Mr Gehlot stated that regular healthcare services are being provided at the Satellite Hospital, and many people benefit from OPD-IPD facilities. This service sets an exemplary example. He mentioned that Late Mr. Katarea's family is carrying forward his legacy of public service. He also shed light on the contribution of former Prime Minister Late Mr. Rajiv Gandhi on this occasion. Welfare of all sections is the goal of the state government. The Chief Minister said that the state government is committed to the welfare of all sections, and we are continuously working to provide relief to the people. He stated that the schemes implemented in Rajasthan are unparalleled in the entire country. Through the Chiranjeevi Yojana, every individual in the state is being provided with better healthcare facilities, including expensive tests, medicines, and treatments free of cost. As part of the Indira Gandhi LPG Subsidy Scheme, 14 lakh women have benefited from an Indira Gandhi gas cylinder subsidy by pressing a single button, aiming to provide cylinders for Rs. 500 to alleviate inflation for the needy. He mentioned that financial assistance of Rs.

40,000 would be provided to cattle rearers for the death of lactating animals due to black-leg disease in Jaipur on 16th June. Free electricity of 100 units is being provided to the general public and 2000 units to farmers. Insurance facilities of Rs. 40,000 are being provided to livestock breeders under the Kamdhenu Scheme. Efforts are also underway to provide water to every household. Solar energy plants are being installed at a large scale for electricity production in the state. Rajasthan is progressing in every sector. Mr Gehlot stated that Rajasthan is progressing in every sector, including education and health. He mentioned that 90 universities have been opened in Rajasthan, and new colleges and universities are being continuously opened. Under the Anuprati Yojana, children are provided free coaching facilities to lay



the foundation for a better future. Under the Kali Bai Bhil Scooter Scheme, talented girls are provided with scooters. The state government is providing a minimum pension of Rs. 1000 for social security and announced a 15% annual pension increase. During this visit, Mr Gehlot announced the upgradation of Barapal to Sub-Tehsil, various development works costing 5 crores at the Satellite Hospital, and an increase of 100 beds. On this occasion, Minister in charge Mr Ram Lal Jat, former Union Minister Dr Girija Vyas, Minister of State Mr Jagdish Raj Shirmali, MLA Preti Shaktawat, former MP Mr Raghuveer Meena, Mr Dinesh Khodaniya, Mr Lalsingh Jhala, Mr Pankaj Kumar Sharma, Mr Bhim Singh Rajawat, Mr Manish Meena, Mr Dayaram Parmar, Mrs Sajjan kataria and her son Vivek Katarea and many other dignitaries were present.

"Nurturing Values: The Role of Mothers and the Power of Science and Spirituality"

Udaipur: "According to B.K. Shivani, the acquisition of values begins from the very moment of conception, when a human being is still in the womb of their mother. She believes that these values play a crucial role in the development of the brain during the nine months of pregnancy. B.K. Shivani emphasized that the formation of a successful individual is deeply influenced by the values they receive as children. No matter how high they climb in life, true success cannot be achieved without instilling good values from the early stages. Therefore, she urged all mothers to be mindful of the values they instill in their children." B.K. Shivani shared these thoughts as the keynote speaker at the 10th Udaipur Convention on Neurotheology, a collaborative event organized by the Pacific Medical College &



Hospital, Udaipur, and the Brahma Kumaris organization. The convention took place at the Swami Vivekananda Auditorium, Mohan Lal Sukhadia University, Udaipur. In her address, B.K. Shivani stressed the importance of integrating science, spirituality, and lifestyle changes to cultivate positive values. The inauguration of the convention commenced with the ceremonial lighting of a lamp by distinguished individuals including psychiatrist Dr. Riri Trivedi, Rajendra Goyal (DIG of Narcotics Bureau), Rahul Agrawal (Chairman of Pacific Medical University), Preeti Agrawal, Dr. A.P. Gupta (Vice Chancellor), Dr. M.M. Mangal (Principal of PMCH), Dr. Atulabh Vajpeyi (Professor and Head of the Department of Neurosciences), Dr. Manisha Vajpeyi, and Dr. Mrityunjay (Executive Secretary of Brahma Kumaris organization at Mount Abu). During the event, psychiatrist Dr. Riri Trivedi emphasized the importance of shielding children from fear and negative emotions to promote their holistic development and prevent trauma. Dr. Atulabh Vajpeyi, Professor and Head of the Department of Neurosciences, provided insights into the relationship between spirituality, neurology, and scientific foundations. He highlighted the concept of AQ (Adversity Quotient) alongside IQ and EQ, stating that the harmonious functioning of the

right and left brain leads to the development of SQ (Spiritual Quotient), which signifies higher wisdom. The cultivation of SQ enables individuals to experience happiness, peace, compassion, and love while maintaining a stress-free existence. Dr. Vajpeyi emphasized the role of yoga, meditation, and pranayama in fostering spiritual intelligence. The convention also featured discussions on modern education and educational policies, led by prominent educators such as Rahul Agrawal (Chairman of PMU), Dr. A.P. Gupta (Vice Chancellor), Dr. J.K. Chhaparwal (Vice Chancellor of Sai Tirupati University), Dr. B.P. Sharma (Former Vice Chancellor of Gautam Buddha University), Dr. P.K. Singh (Dean of CTAE), Dr. Saurabh Gupta (Professor at IIM Udaipur), Dr. Lokesh Jain (Scholars Arena), Sanjay Datta (CEO of MMPS), Sajay Narwaniya (DPS), Naina Chavare (Principal of Mount Litera School), Dr. Prem Bhandari (Distinguished Scholar), and Dr. Pratap Mehta (Director of Global Hospital and Research Center at Mount Abu). The discussion panel was moderated by renowned speaker Dr. Anand Gupta from Udaipur. In conclusion, Dr. Mrityunjay, Executive Secretary of Brahma Kumaris organization at Mount Abu, expressed gratitude and delivered a divine message to conclude the program. Sachin Pilot's Rift with Chief Minister Gehlot Continues Amidst Party Tensions

In the latest developments surrounding Sachin Pilot's relationship with Rajasthan Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot, it appears that the tensions and differences between the two leaders are far from being resolved. Despite earlier speculations of Pilot leaving the Congress party and forming a new party, those rumors have been proven false. However, the strained relationship between Pilot and Gehlot remains a cause for concern within the Congress party. Sachin Pilot, the former Deputy Chief Minister of Rajasthan, has remained firm in his demands and remains unsatisfied with the explanations provided by Chief Minister Gehlot. While attempts at reconciliation have taken place between Pilot, Congress National President Mallikarjun Kharge, and former President Rahul Gandhi, it is evident that the cracks in their relationship have yet to be fully repaired. Previously, Pilot had staged a one-day fast and organized a large rally to showcase his strength and exert pressure on the Gehlot government. Despite setting a deadline for the fulfillment of his demands, they were not met. Although Pilot did not make any significant announcements on June 11, the anniversary of his late father's death, he did not refrain from using sarcasm to criticize his opponents, including Gehlot.

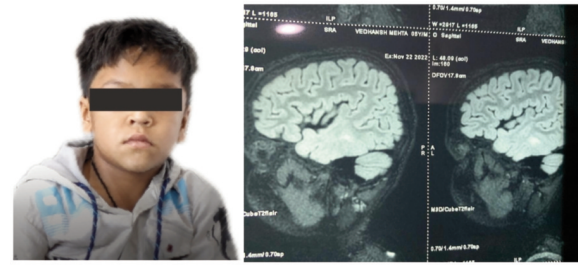
The ongoing tensions between Pilot and Gehlot raise concerns about the potential impact on the Congress party in the upcoming assembly elections scheduled for November-December this year. Despite Rahul Gandhi's attempts to reconcile both leaders, bridging their differences has become increasingly challenging. Reports suggest that the Congress high command might appoint Pilot as the chairman of the election coordination committee, leveraging his popularity among the youth while capitalizing on Gehlot's successful schemes.

At present, Gehlot enjoys the majority support of MLAs, making it unlikely for him to be replaced before the assembly elections, as seen in Punjab. However, the recent program organized by Pilot saw only a few ministers and MLAs in attendance, indicating the persistent division within the party between supporters of both Gehlot and Pilot. Gehlot's supporters argue that he provided protection and support to Pilot following the untimely demise of his father, Rajesh Pilot, who had a close association with Gehlot since the era of Prime Minister Indira Gandhi and Rajiv Gandhi. However, Gehlot believes that every mistake has consequences, and Pilot's rebellious attitude and actions against the party have led to his prolonged exclusion from key positions within the state.

During a program commemorating his father's death anniversary, Pilot used the opportunity to respond to Gehlot's dismissal of his demand for compensation in the paper leak case as intellectual bankruptcy. Pilot emphasized the importance of sincerely helping the poor and youth, highlighting the need for a compassionate approach.

Pilot also expressed his opposition to the alleged scams during the previous Vasundhara Raje government, stressing the necessity of investigating them. Without directly naming Gehlot, he suggested that every mistake should be punished, indirectly criticizing his opponents. Furthermore, Pilot emphasized the significance of justice, irrespective of personal relationships, and reaffirmed his commitment to fighting for the rights of the people. He acknowledged that his father, Rajesh Pilot, who came from a humble farmer's family but achieved great heights while maintaining his integrity, taught him the importance of staying true to one's beliefs. Pilot reiterated his determination to uphold his voice and the public's trust, stating that credibility is the most valuable asset in politics. He asserted that he has always worked towards improving the future of the youth and mentioned the unwavering support he receives from the people of Dausa, his father's region of influence, which strengthens his resolve. During the meeting, Pilot prevented a talkative minister from giving a speech to avoid controversies and cited the need to leave early for.

EPILEPSY SURGERY A HOPE OF CURE FOR EPILEPSY PATIENTS



Master Vaibhav (Changed Name) - A 9 year old boy was brought to Neurology Department of Geetanjali Medical College & Hospital, Udaipur for evaluation of epileptic seizures. This child suffered from this disease since the age of 5 years. His parents consulted multiple doctors including Neurologists for this disease. He had many medications but he continued to get daily 2-3 seizures. During seizures, child would fall suddenly, became unconscious, body became stiff and his breathing would be fast for 15-20 minutes. Child had to

discontinue his schooling and his whole family was immensely disturbed. They came to know about the epilepsy surgery program of GMCH. After thorough investigations including 3.0 Tesla MRI and Video EEG, it was found that the child's epilepsy was caused by a brain disease called 'Focal Cortical Dysplasia' (FCD). FCD is caused by defect in the shape and structure of a group of neurons in a portion of brain and usually cause epilepsy which doesn't get controlled easily with medications. Child's parents were explained in detail about the option of epilepsy surgery by Dr Anis Jukkarwala, who currently heads the Neurology Department of GMCH. The team of Neurosurgeons Dr Udai Bhaumik, Dr Aditya Gupta,

Dr Govind Mangal, Dr Nilesh Bhatnagar (Neuroanesthetist), OT staff and technicians, performed surgery in this child under guidance of high quality microscope and intraoperative electrocorticography. Child got discharged from hospital after 7 days in stable condition. He has no seizures so far even after 5 months and started going to school. His medications have reduced to one-fourth of previous dose and hopefully would get stopped in near future. Epilepsy once thought an incurable disease is now under purview of cure by means of epilepsy surgery. Epilepsy surgery is not like routine neurosurgeries, it needs lot of expertise, perseverance and a good team for execution. Epilepsy surgery team of GMCH led by Dr Anis Jukkarwala is an example for this.



Child's parents are happy and hopeful about his future. Epilepsy surgery truly is a hope of cure for carefully selected patients in whom epilepsy is not controlled by medications.
