BJP state president submitted suggestions through a letter

Chittorgarh: In the upcoming crop year 2023-24, the BJP state president and Chittorgarh MP C.P. Joshi has submitted suggestions through a letter in a meeting organized by the Narcotics Department in Kota for the proposed opium policy, aiming to provide more convenience to farmers and to address the issues of delayed licenses due to various reasons.

According to the spokesperson of the MP, Raghuv Sharma, the letter sent by MP C.P. Joshi for the upcoming opium policy stated that all types of contracts, whether they are below the average quality, have been cut, or have any other form of deterioration since 1998 until now, should be restored. The daily weighing should be discontinued because opium contains water when it is extracted. Over time, the water evaporates and reduces the weight of opium.

Farmers who are considered eligible for opium licenses should be informed in writing by the department about their eligibility for licenses. If a farmer does not want to cultivate the crop, it should be recorded in writing, and the responsibility for this should lie with the department. The weighing work should be completed within 45 days of opium cultivation.

For the farmers who received licenses in the previous year but could not sow the crop due to various reasons, they should also be given permission to cultivate the crop in the same year. Those who were given only a 1 kg concession earlier during 1998-2003 should have this concession increased. Farmers whose average yield has not been achieved for 5 consecutive years should be provided an annual average yield concession. The cases of opium cultivators whose crop was stolen before weighing and who filed a police complaint should be considered sympathetically, and they should also be provided an opportunity for opium cultivation. Licensed farmers who face water scarcity should be allowed to sow the crop in other

For the farmers who were given new licenses in 1998-99 but could not sow the crop due to water scarcity, the department should provide them with licenses again, as per the information provided by the department. In the transfer of deceased farmers, apart from the legal heirs such as the spouse, sons, daughters, other legitimate successors mentioned in the application, such as adopted sons, daughters, grandchildren, or any other successor mentioned by the farmer, the process should be made easier to save farmers from unnecessary has-

The opium policy announcement should be made in the second week of September, and the distribution of licenses should be completed by the last week of September. In the process of opium license distribution, eligible farmers should be allowed to apply online. Along with this, strict action should be taken against irregularities in opium cultivation, and investigations should be conducted against all individuals involved, and appropriate action should be taken against them.

The Mysterious Disappearance of **38 Truck Trailers**



In a shocking turn of events, 38 truck trailers loaded with valuable goods were reported missing, sparking a wave of concern among the authorities. The Royal Police quickly formed a team and dispatched them to Gujarat to investigate the mat-

Upon arrival, the Royal Police established contact with the local Gujarat Police and initiated an official investigation. The case was registered, and the inquiry began at the Royala Police Station. The area's police chief, Sunil Chaudhary, provided details of the incident.

According to the victims, the truck and trailer owners, a man named Ram Chandra Pandya, posing as a representative of Hindustan Zinc Limited, approached them with an offer to rent their vehicles. To secure the deal, Ram Chandra Pandya communicated with Kishan Lal Gadari, who facilitated the rental arrangements. However, it was Kishan Lal Gadari who ultimately took possession of the trucks and transported them to Rajkot, Gujarat, to sell them as scrap to Jamil Kabadi.

The truck owners were deceived, as their vehicles were fraudulently rented and subsequently disappeared. Reports of the 38 missing trailers reached the Royala Police Station, cre-

ating a sense of urgency within the police administration. Several truck owners, who had recently discovered their trucks missing, arrived at the Royala Police Station to report the incidents. Led by Devi Lal Gurjar, they voiced their concerns and officially filed their reports. The police promptly registered a case against the individuals responsible for the fraudulent scheme of stealing trucks and trailers.

The victims explained that they became suspicious when they lost track of their rented vehicles for several days. Using GPS technology, they traced the location where the trucks had disappeared and found that the scrap dealers were dismantling the trucks into pieces.

Unbeknownst to the scrap dealers, their illicit activities had been exposed by the GPS trackers, making it easier for the police to follow their trail. The Royala Police Station remained in constant communication with the Gujarat Police, coordinating their efforts. A specialized team was formed and sent to Gujarat to aid in the investigation.

Police and excise department conducted a joint operation

Kota: Under the direction of SP Sharad Choudharv, the police and excise department conducted a joint operation, destroying a large quantity of illicit liquor

The Kota SP, Sharad Choudhary (IPS), stated that they received information about illicit liquor production in the well of the Kalam village in the Ranpur police station area. They took this information seriously and, under the guidance of Additional Superintendent of Police Praveen Kumar Jain, a team led by Deputy Superintendent of Police Harshraj Singh Kherda, Deputy Superintendent of Police Dharma Veer Singh, Excise Department's Deputy Superintendent Atul Agarkar, and Thana In-charge Pushpendra Jhajharia from Anantpura, Anil Joshi from Arkepura, Manoj Kumar Sikarwar from Udyog Nagar, Mukesh from Gumanpura, and Babulal from Kotwali, along with Thana In-charge Rajesh Pathak from Dadabari and Thana In-charge Parmajit from Mahaveer Nagar, conducted a joint operation at the locations of illegal liquor production in Gram



During the operation, the police and excise department formed joint teams and raided the Kalam village in the Ranpur police station area. Two individuals involved in the illicit liquor trade were arrested during this operation. They are Prabhu, son of Mangilal Jati Banjara, aged 36, residing in Kalam's well, and Raju, son of Mangilal Jati Banjara, aged 32, resid-

A case was registered against them at the Ranpur police station in Kota City for producing illicit liquor, and a total of 50 litres of illicit liquor in handi pots was seized. Additionally, around 1500 litres of wash used in the production of illicit liquor were found stored in barrels at these locations, which were destroyed by the team by mixing them with soil. Furthermore, three charges were filed against the accused ndividuals producing illicit liquor at these locations. This operation was conducted under the supervision of SP Sharad Choudhary in the Kota district.
