Immunotherapy Effective in Cancer Treatment

Udaipur: Advancements in medical science continue to bring new diagnostic tests and treatment techniques for cancer, a disease often considered incurable in India. At a one-day conference of medical oncologists in Udaipur, Dr. Manoj Mahajan highlighted the benefits and drawbacks of immunotherapy. Oncologists from across the state shared case-based experiences, noting that immunotherapy benefits cancer patients with fewer side effects compared to chemotherapy.

Dr. Mahajan, Program Director at Pacific Medical and Hospital and Senior Consultant at Paras Health, emphasized that new advancements, including immunotherapy, yield positive results by strengthening the patient's immune system. This technique, now used in Udaipur, has shown significant benefits in many cancer cases by boosting the patient's ability to combat the disease effectively.

The conference featured experts like Dr. Ankit Agarwal, Dr. Aseem Kesamar, Dr. Mukesh Kumar, Dr. Tarachand Gupta, Dr. Hemant Kumar Dadhich, Dr. Renu Mishra, Dr. Sachin Jain, Dr. Abhishek Sharma, Dr. Mansi Sandeep Shah, and Dr. Rohit J. Rebello. They discussed how immune cells help fight cancer cells, directly attacking cancer without harming healthy cells and reducing recurrence likelihood. Immunotherapy also has fewer side effects and can be used to treat other diseases, making it a promising advancement in cancer treatment.
