# A Review of the performance of the play Gordhan Ke Joote

Directed by Deshraj Gurjar, the play Gordhan Ke Joote, was staged in the Darpan Sabhagar of Shilpgram, Udaipur, on September 7, 2024, the second day of the drama festival organized by

West Zone Cultural Centre, Udaipur, in collaboration with Jawahar Kala Kendra, Jaipur. The play was prepared under the JKK's Young Theatre Directors Grant (2022-23).

The play is about a young woman's struggle to lead a life of her own choice. Mathara, born into a traditional family of Rajasthani rural background, is to be married to Deepu, in keeping with their grandfathers' words in the past. While preparations for the wedding are in full swing, getting Mathara a new pair of shoes becomes a problem because of the large size of her feet. An occult practitioner is also consulted to venes and, through his ingeresolve the problem but in

vain. Meanwhile, Mathara's

cousin offers a suggestion to buy the branded shoes of Jordan, a name which is humorouslymispronounced as 'gordhan.' While efforts are being made to procure Jordan shoes from a showroom in Delhi, Mathara's father, Bansi, and Deepu's father, Kesar, fall out on a trivial issueand declare the marriage as cancelled. Eventually, Kesar's uncle inter-

nious design, resolves the conflict. Finally, Deepu arrives to

marry Mathara, but the latter decides to leave the house to pursue her career as a basketball player. At that moment, Deepu, who has so far shown no courage to speak against injustice, suddenly steps forward to stand by Mathara. The play ends with Mathara's victory in freeing herself from the oppressive traditions of patriarchy and asserting her own

Saxena acted out Mathara's conflict beautifully. She consistently displayed the hesitant behavior of one who is divided between her compulsion to go by the expectations of the family and her own desire to pursue her cherished goals. While declaring her decision to participate in the national level basketball tournament, her polite vet firm voice marked her dramatic excellence. In the climactic scene, she impeccably portrayed Mathara's psy-

Shalini Kumari, contributed well towards creating fun, humour and a vivid atmosphere of typical wedding celebrations in rural towns of Rajasthan. Light design was excellently done byShubham Tiwari, Sahil Ahuja, and Arbaz Hussain. Music was managed well by Animesh Acharya.

Though the play seemed to resonate well with the audience because of its abundant humor and sensuous appeal, it fell short of being a well-knit theatrical production. Too much and too frequent hurly-burly on the stage often appeared chaotic and intrusive. Some scenes were superfluously lengthened at the cost of the thematic impact of the play.

#### **Review of the Stage Performance of Shanta** Gandhi's Play, Jasma Odhan

The performance of Shanta Gandhi's Jasma Odhan, a musical play in the Bhavai folk form of Gujarat, opened a three-day drama festival organized by West Zone Cultural Centre, on September 6, 2024 in Darpan Sabhagar of Shilpgram, Udaipur. Jasma Odhan is a poignant story about an apsara, Kaamkundala, who is cursed by Naala rishi for

breaking his penance at the behest of Lord Indra. In return, the apsara, too, curses the rishi. Consequently, the apsara and the rishi are born in the poor labourers' commu-



nity of Auds as Jasma and Roopa. The circumstances lead Jasma to marry Roopa, an ugly looking and physically deformed labourer. Barot, a eunuch, tells king Siddharaj about the beauty of Jasma. Enamoured of Jasma's beauty, the king proposes to marry her. But when Jasma refuses, he gets angry and kills her husband, Roopa. However, the play ends on a happy note when Nayak, as a divine agen,t miraculously brings Roopa back to life. The play underlines the worthiness of labour and dignity of womanhood.

Directed by multi-talented theatre artist Shusheel Kumar Sharma, the play was impactfully performed by the artists of Bareilly-based Rang Vinayak Rangmandal (RVRM), functioning under the aegis of Daya Drishti Charitable Trust of Uttar Pradesh.

Among the artists, Danish Khan as Naala rishi and Roopa stood out as the most applauded performer. His ability to achieve a complete metamorphosis from one character to another in terms of expressions, gestures, accent, and tone marked his dramatic brilliance. It was difficult to believe that the rishi and Roopa were played by the same artist. The limp in Roopa's leg was so consistently maintained that the audience began to wonder whether it was a congenital defect of the artist himself.

Samyun Khan, portraying the apsara and Jasma, seemed to be at her best while cursing Naala rishi as Kamkundala and repelling the immoral amorous advances of king Siddharaj as Jasma. The vehemence in her voice in both contexts was

The rapid eye movement and changes in facial expressions as exhibited by Himanshu Gangwar, performing chiefly as sutradhar named Rangla, at first appeared comical and impressive, but gradually, they tended to be stereotyped when Himanshu kept repeating them even while playing other characters. His performance did contribute to humour in the play, but his racy dialogues often resulted in the loss of clarity in articulation. The same drawback was shared by his companion, Ajay Chauhaan, another sutradhar named Nayak.

The other artists, including Aashi as Neelam pari (nymph) and Bhali. Siddhi as Leelam pari and villager. Riva as apsara and villager, Vijay as Indradev, Shobhit Gangwar as Dala, Shubha Bhatt Bhasin as Dali, Muneesh as Bhala, Abhishek as Pundit Ji and villager, Sparsh as Barot and villager, Ayush as Dhoodhmal and villager, and Kshitij as king Siddhraj, were all gratifying in their performance. 

Despite being on ventilator support at Geetanjali Medical College & Hospital (GMCH), she succumbed to her critical condition. Honoring her final wish, her son, Mr. Deepak Khanna, donated her body for medical research. Mrs. Khanna believed that serving humanity shouldn't end with life and hoped her body would aid future doctors in learning and research

Mr. Khanna shared that body donation was a family tradition, with Mrs. Lalita Puri, another family member, having donated her body the previous year. The Khanna family advocates that at least one person in every household should make this noble contribution.

Dr. Prakash K.G., Head of Anatomy at GMCH, praised the family's decision and emphasized

the importance of raising awareness about body donation. The GMCH faculty, including Dean Dr. Sangeeta Gupta and other professors, paid tribute to Mrs. Khanna. A Certificate of Appreciation was awarded to her family. Body donation plays a critical role in advancing medical science, allowing future doctors to learn and conduct research, ultimately benefiting society as a whole.

## Cancer Udaipur: The second day of the fourth national conference, \*Trends of

Transformation in Oncology: Screen and Treat\*, focused on breast, colon, and prostate cancer. Experts stressed the importance of accurate diagnosis through advanced techniques to create effective treatment plans. Dr. Manoj Mahajan, Program Director, explained that early



Vijay highlighted that early-stage breast cancer can be managed if patients recognize symptoms early. Discussions on colon cancer emphasized using modern technologies for early diagnosis. Dr. Nitin Singhal described how colon polyps can turn cancerous, and therapies like chemotherapy and targeted treatment can be highly effective. Prostate cancer, mainly affecting men over 60, is largely asymptomatic but highly treat-

able when detected early. Dr. Kshitij Domadia and Dr. Lalit Mohan Sharma shared that robotic surgery is now a preferred treatment due to its minimal side effects. Prostate cancer survival rates are as high as 95% in early stages. The conference highlighted that breast and prostate cancers require awareness and early

intervention for better outcomes, and modern diagnostic and treatment techniques should be expanded to improve patient care.
