Dawoodi Bohra Community Marks Islamic New Year

Udaipur: The Dawoodi Bohra community commenced the Islamic New Year Hijri 1447 on Thursday, 26 June 2025. On the eve of the New Year. members of the community greeted each other with tradi-

tional wishes and celebrated with family feasts, presenting decorated food platters and enjoying communal dining in a warm and festive spirit.

According to community spokesperson Mansoor Ali Odawala, the day also marked the Urs of Syedi Khanjipir Sahib, where special decorations were arranged at the Khanjipir Dargah, followed by a communal niyaz and majlis. From this day onward, the

community embarks on ten days of mourning to commemorate the martyrdom of Hazrat Imam Hussain (A.S.), the grandson of Prophet Muhammad (PBUH), in the Battle of Karbala.

Various neighborhoods of the Bohra community, including Boharwadi, were adorned with lights and "Sabeels" (refreshment stalls) to honor the occasion.

Udaipur: Under the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, animal welfare committees will be established in higher education institutions to promote ethical, humanistic, and constitutional values among students. Acting on the directive of the central government, UGC Secretary Prof. Manish Joshi issued a letter on June 13 to university vice-chancellors, college principals, and nstitutional heads, mandating action in this direction.

Shraman Dr. Pushpendra welcomed this historic move, statng that the primary goal of forming such committees is to inculcate values such as empathy, compassion, cooperation, and responsibility among students. It also aims to raise awareness among youth regarding Article 51A(g) of the Indian Constitution, which emphasizes compassion toward all living creatures. Committees to Conduct Awareness and Educational Programs

These committees will organize lectures, workshops, and film screenings on animal protection laws, environmental ethics, disease management, and best practices in animal care. Campus initiatives will include the creation of safe feeding zones, first aid teams for animals in distress, and partnerships with local veteri-

Awareness campaigns will focus on animal protection laws, environment, and cruelty prevention. The committees will promote plastic-free and animal-friendly campuses and undertake studies on the implementation of the Prevention of Cruelty to

Students will be encouraged to intern with District SPCAs, veterinary hospitals, forest departments, or rescue and disaster management organizations working for animal welfare. UGC Promotes Community Engagement and Research

The UGC has advised universities to encourage the formation of these committees and promote outreach activities, internships, and research fellowships in this domain. Animal welfare is considered an integral part of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), especially SDG 12 (Responsible Consumption), SDG 13 (Climate Action), SDG 15 (Life on Land), and SDG 3 (Good Health and Well-being).

Animals Act and other relevant laws. Legal aid camps and public interest research activities will also be carried out.

Engaging youth in animal welfare initiatives is expected to support their personal and academic growth. It is worth noting that earlier, on February 25, 2025, the Ministry of Road Transport and Highways had also directed all states and union territories to prominently display the slogan "Be Kind to Animals" on all buses and public vehicles.

Conservation Demands Raised at Nandeswar Dam Lake Dialogue

Udaipur: During the "Lake Dialogue" held at Nandeswar Dam on Sunday, several concerns were raised regarding the cleanliness of the lake and the associated channels, with a special appeal made for regular desilting of the reservoir.

Lake enthusiast Dr. Anil Mehta emphasized that the Nandeswar Dam serves as a flood retention pond located upstream of Lake Pichola. He cautioned that any increase in pollution here would directly impact Pichola. He further suggested that under the Amrit Sarovar Scheme, ecological and environmental protection of the reservoir must be ensured.

Tej Shankar Paliwal stated that the amount of silt reaching Lake Pichola has significantly increased in recent years. To control this, he stressed the necessity of regular and scientific desilting of the Nandeswar Dam to not only increase its stor-

age capacity but also to trap silt before it flows into Pichola.

Nandkishore Sharma highlighted the growing pollution around the Nandeswar channel and stressed the need to curbit, warning that an increase in waste in the channel and river could adversely affect the quality of drinking water.

Kushal Rawal advocated for a construction ban in the hills surrounding the Nandeswar pond and called for intensive

afforestation efforts in the area. Drupad Singh proposed that Nandeswar pond be declared an "Amrit Pokhar" and measures be taken to protect it from pollution. Prior to the dialogue, volunteers participated in a cleanliness drive, removing plastic and polythene waste from the area.
