Farmers' Innovations Must Be Refined and Shared Nationwide: Dr.Rajbir Singh



Udaipur (Dr.LatikaVyas): Significant transformation in the agricultural sector can be achieved when farmers, scientists, and extension professionals collaborate, said Dr.Rajbir Singh, Deputy Director General (Extension), ICAR, New Delhi. Addressing the 23rd Extension Education Council Meeting at MPUAT, Udaipur, Dr. Singh emphasized that farmers are true innovators, consistently solving field-level issues through experimentation. Their innovations should be scientifically refined and disseminated nationwide through KrishiVigyanKendras (KVKs).

The meeting, held at the Directorate of Extension Education, was attended by heads of eight KVKs, IFFCO representatives, and farmers. Dr. Singh praised the ViksitKrishiSankalpAbhiyan, which reached 1.35 crore farmers across India, including over 8 lakh in Rajasthan. He urged all 731 KVKs to become dynamic "Mini Universities" and central hubs for modern agriculture.

Dr.Ajeet Kumar Karnataka, Vice Chancellor of MPUAT, who presided over the session, highlighted India's achievements—354 million tonnes of food grains, 362 million tonnes of horticulture produce, and record milk and egg production. He called for greater focus on pulses, oilseeds, and natural farming.

MPUAT's excellence was also noted: it received the Chancellor's Award in 2022 and has signed 81 MoUs, including international partnerships. The university currently runs 97 research and industry-funded projects and has generated 280 actionable recommendations for farmers.

Dr.ChandeshwarTiwari suggested launching agricultural diploma courses to attract youth, while Dr. J.P. Mishra and Dr. R.L. Soni stressed the importance of low-chemical farming, water conservation, and climate-resilient technologies aligned with "Viksit Bharat 2047".

Herbal Unani medicine capable of normalising the level of calcium in the blood: Dr. Liyaqat Ali Mansury



The normal level of calcium in the body's blood is between 8.5 and 10.2 mg/litre. If the calcium level in the blood is less than 8.5 ma/dL. it is called

hypocalcaemia. And if the calcium level in the blood is higher than 10.2 mg/dL, it is called hypercalcaemia.

Functions of calcium in the body-

1. Calcium is the main component of the structure of bones and teeth, which helps keep them strong and healthy.

2. . Calcium is essential for muscle contraction and relaxation, which is important for body mobility.

3. . Calcium is also essential for the proper functioning of the nervous system, which helps in communication between different organs and systems of the body.

- 4. . Calcium is also involved in the clotting process of blood, which helps stop bleeding when injured. Symptoms of calcium deficiency-
 - 1. Muscle cramps and pain.
- 2. . Fatigue and weakness. 3. . Changes in mental health including forgetfulness, confusion, depression and anxiety.
 - 4. Dryskin and brittle nails.
 - 5. . Dental problems.
 - 6. Weakness of bones. 7. Thick hair.
 - 8. . Abnormal heartbeat.

- 1. Calcium level in the blood . 2. . A significant portion of calcium in the blood is bound to albumin. Therefore, albumin levels are also measured.
- 3. . Blood tests for magnesium, phosphorus, pth, vitamin D levels.

4. . Electrocardiogram (ECG) test for cardiac rhythm abnormalities.

1. To increase the calcium level Kushta Conch, KushtaGodanti, Yeast Marwarid, Extract Celery, HabbeAsgand HabbeShilajit, JawarishAwla, MajunJograjGugal,

Extract Maul Leham etc. are used. 2. In the form of home recipes - gilloy basil leaves, sesame seeds, soaked chona or its water, milk and cinnamon etc. are given.

3. Eat calcium-rich foods such as dairy products such as yoghurt, cheese, milk, green leafy vegetables, ragi, oats, oranges, tomatoes, soybeans, sesame and calcium-fortified foods.

4. Take vitamin D too-Vitamin D helps in the absorption of calcium, so it is also important to get enough vitamin D

5. Take supplements—If you are not getting enough calcium in your diet, you can take calcium supplements like dates, bananas, almonds, gram and makhana
