Ashok Gehlot Champions Gandhi Darshan in Udaipur

Udaipur witnessed a landmark divisional- Auditorium, graced by former Chief Minister and senior Gandhian leader Ashok Gehlot. The JeevanDarshan Committee at the RNT event brought together district, sub-division,

Gehlot stressed that just as Gandhi Ji achieved independence through non-violence, today's soci-

ety must collectively strive to eradicate social evils, poverty, unemployment, and discrimination.

During the program, Gehlothonored families of martyrs, including the Nagoris, Zakiuddin, and war veteran Durga Shankar Paliwal, presenting shawls and mementos. The workshop also featured addresses by Prof. SatishRai. National Coordinator, and several district convenors. Spirituality Heals Mind, Says Jain Saint Pulak Sagar

Udaipur: Addressing the 12th National Conference of the Udaipur Course on Neurosciences, Jain Saint PulakSagarJiMaharaj emphasized, "Doctors treat the body, but spirituality heals the mind. Most illnesses originate in the mind, not the body. True healing comes through pure thoughts, spirituality, and surrender to the Divine." The conference, organized by Pacific Centre of Neurosciences at Sukhadia Auditorium, highlighted the integration of Indian spiritual traditions with modern medical practices.

PulakSagarJi elaborated on the role of spirituality in Indian culture, explaining how age-old practices guide emotional well-being and inner peace. Rahul and PreetiAgarwal of Pacific Medical University highlighted that meditation and spirituality can enhance moral values and emotional balance in healthcare. Prof. Atulabh Vajpayee, Head of Neurosciences, spoke on Neurotheology—the study of the brain, nervous system, and sound therapy—explaining how harmonizing IQ, EQ, and SQ (Spiritual Quotient) fosters compassion, peace, and stress-free living. The conference also showcased the contributions of the Brahma Kumaris. BK Girish presented his research on the "Soul-Brain Interface," demonstrating how Rajyoga meditation awakens inner energy and improves mental health, decision-making, and
